Protest Must be Maintained.

The campaign inaugurated by the Board of Trade on Tuesday, and endorsed by the principal merchants of Carbonear, must not be permitted to abate. To do so would be to accept defeat without making any supreme effort for victory. The very fact that Carbonear so soon telegraphed its approval of the action taken is significant, and doubtless the expression from that town will be followed by similar sentiments from the commercial men of others in Conception, Trinity, Bonavista, and Notre Dame Bays, as well as from the South and West sections of the island. The receiving of further endorsement will strengthen the position of the Board of Trade in the equitable demand made on the Government, through the Governor in Council, and will enable them to continue the fight in the event of their proposals being turned down. There can be no surrender now of the principles adopted. If the Government shows fight, then give it all the fight it wants. There are no excessive demands in the Board of Trade petition, and not one which cannot be acceded to. There is nothing impossible nor out of question in the reasonable request made that the Government should immediately begin to reduce taxation, to retrench and to eliminate all extravagant expenditure. But if the Budget Speech delivered by the Prime Minister Wednesday afternoon is by way of an answer to the resolutions, then let the battle be waged to the bitter end or until the Prime Minister and his Executive see reason. If the Government will not reduce taxation, and is determined to follow up its record of useless expenditure, there is but one course open to the trade. That is import but the bare necessities and then only in such quantities as will serve for short periods of consumption. No imports, no duties; no duties, no revenue; no reduction of taxation, no supplies for the fishery or no employment for labor.

Drastic, yes, but how else can the situation be met? On an average the Government is forcing a tax of sixty-five cents out of every dollar earned by consumers, thus leaving but thirty-five cents for the support and maintenance of families. A man earning one thousand dollars per annum actually has but three hundred and fifty dollars to be applied to family use. Six hundred and fifty dollars go in taxes to the Government. How then can the masses live? The same ratio applies to lower salaries. Merchants to-day are asking the Government to reduce taxation on imports in order that they may be able to import and keep up stock. They are prepared to suffer loss on such goods as they have on their shelves and in their stores

brought into the Colony since June 5, 1921, when the super and sales tax abominations were added to the tariff. They readily perceive that they must lower their present prices if the Government accede to their request, and they are prepared to do so without hesitation. If the Government refuses to heed their appeal, then there is no alternative, but to refrain from purchasing abroad. What such a decision will mean to the Colony is frightful to contemplate. No revenues mean that the administration of the Government cannot be carried on. No revenues mean that no money can be spent in the public service, and no money for relief, whether casual or permanent. Therefore if we all become dependent on the Colony's funds, and no production ensuing, how long will Newfoundland exist? The future is hopeless. By deferring the Budget and adjusting the tariff temporarily, the Government can do a whole lot to lighten the load and to brighten the future. But should the Prime Minister prove adamant and callously refuse the prayer of the petition he will make such a scourge for himself as was never dreamed of by the flagellants of old. There is time to consider and Sir Richard will be well advised to do so, unless in his persistence he wants the whole structure of Government torn down about his ears.

Sensational Spending.

BADGER, DEER LAKE AND OTHER USELESS ROADS COST \$741,219.40!

(From Auditor General's Report.)

"During my tenure of office as Auditor General I have never known of an expenditure so unproductive of even moderate results as that in connection with these two roads (Badger-Hall's Bay and Deer Lake-Bonne Bay). These roads may have been, and doubtless were, a necessity, but under existing financial circumstances they could not be afforded. The necessity which brought about their construction did not in my opinion, exist to the extent represented. While there was undoubtedly much unemployment at the time they were started, and considerable destitution, yet the cure for that should have been found in the fish industry. At no time in the history of Newfoundland, to my knowledge, has it been necessary to find employment for some five thousand men during the fishing season. Even with fish at its lowest this season, it would have been better for these men, and infinitely better for the Colony's finances, if they had continued at their proper vocation.

Police Ready.

The police force is now ready to cope with any disturbances which may break out in the city. Caught on Roof.

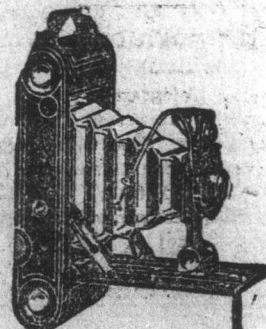
