### Past and Present.

The ceremony of depositing the colors of the Royal Nfld. Regiment Fencible Infantry, at the Museum on Saturday was the first function of its kind in this respect and therefore unique in the annals of Terra Nova. It is a great pity that so little is known of these colors, but it is evident from their age, though in a remarkable state of preservation, that both flags accompanied the Regiment through all the actions in which it took part. It was a solemn moment when His Excellency the Governor pulled the ribbon strings which released the flags, and as their faded colors fluttered downwards, a most impressive silence was observed. Surely the spirits of the old Fencibles were present at this particular instant, and joined with the men of the present Royal Newfoundland Regiment in acknowledging the unfurling of the standards under which they so long and so bravely fought, and doing final honor to them in the general salute. A history of the Newfoundland Fencibles was published in the Telegram last year, the copy having been made from original documents and records in the office of military archives at Ottawa. This history showed that the Regiment had fought all over Canada during the war with United States 1812-14, and had done its part in helping to save that portion of North America to England. The Newfoundland soldiers of that day were every whit as versatile as those of the present era. They could be soldiers, sailors, voyageurs, or woodsmen with equal facility, as documents which have been given publicity prove. To their everlasting memory and in testimony of their bravery and discipline, their colors, now placed in the Museum, where they may be seen daily are silent though eloquent witnesses.

The military colors of a regiment of British Infantry since the days of Queen Anne have been two. Of these the first, the King's or Royal Color is the Union Jack. The second or regimental color is of the same color as the facings of the regiment, except these regiments whose facings are white, when the regimental color is the Cross of St. George in a white field, with the territorial designation and the Royal or other title displayed within the Union wreath of roses, thistles and shamrocks ensigned with the Imperial Crown, and bearing the ancient devices, badges, distinctions and mottoes conferred by royal authority. The King's color of the Fencibles is, as noted, a Union Jack. The regimental color is blue with the rose, thistle and shamrock, surmounted by a crown, in the fly. Both flags are of very fine silk and show signs of having been given every care. They form a very valuable asset to the Museum's

exhibits, and connect past with present, patriotically and sentimentally, and tell of the achievements of the days when Britain was fighting, practically the whole world.

### An Eloquent Tribute

(From a Contemporary.)

THE LATE W. J. HERDER.

"Better for the silent tongue but the eloquent deed. For in life and in business, despatch is better than discourse; and the shortest answer of all is doing."

The above quotation from Samuel Smiles' Biographies, is peculiarly applicable to the life of the late Wm. J. Herder. His was a life of action, impelled towards achievement by the dominant force of an unconquerable will. The mainspring of what is called force of character, and the sustaining power of all great actions. Mr. W. J. Herder who was the proprietor of the Evening Telegram, passed peacefully away on Sunday last after an illness of short duration; in journalistic circles his passing will be sadly felt, for he has been rightly termed the "Grand old man of Journalism" in Newfoundland and the imprint of his force and character has had a vitalizing effect upon the public opinion of this country for close on half a century of years, and whilst he sought no public place of prominence, his influence was felt throughout the length and breadth of our island, which as a native son, he loved well; and ever directed his energies toward what he conscientiously believed to be for the interests of Newfoundland.

In social circles he was well and popularly known and amongst his Masonic brethren was considered "one of the best."

As to his business life, the story of the growth of the Evening Telegram under his guidance would make an "epic" throbbing with force and energy; and abounding in episodes of interest; whilst his kindly personality won the admiration and esteem of his fellow workers. In the words of Tennyson, "He has lived his life, and that which he has done may God within himself make pure."—Trade Review.

### Round the World By Air.

NEWFOUNDLAND PART OF AERIAL ITINERARY.

LONDON. (Associated Press.)—Major W. T. Blake, navigator, and Capt. Norman MacMillan, pilot, started May 24 on a flight round the world from the Croydon aerodrome. According to present arrangements they will use four machines of different makes for different parts of the journey. With a D. H. 9 aeroplane propelled by a 230 horsepower Siddeley "Puma" engine, the aviators hope to get as far as Calcutta over the ordinary route to India, via Paris, Rome, Athens, Crete, Alexandria, Bagdad, Basra, Karachi, and Delhi, which is approximately seven thousand miles. Using a Fiesle type 5, a floating seaplane, fitted with 350 horsepower Rolls Royce engine, Major Blake and his companion will fly from Calcutta and proceed via Rangoon, Bangkok, Saigon and along the Chinese coast to Japan, Yokohama, and then to Pootung and along the Aleutian Islands and the Alaskan Coast to Vancouver. At Vancouver, the aviators will change into another D. H. 9 which will have been shipped out and erected there, and will then cross Canada down to Chicago and New York. From New York they purpose to fly to Newfoundland, where the fourth machine, a "T" 3 flying boat with two 800 horsepower Rolls Royce engines will be brought into use. On this machine the fliers will go across Greenland, Iceland, and the Faroe Islands to Scotland, landing at Aberdeen. With the average amount of luck Major Blake thinks he can get round the world in three months, which represents roughly about 300 hours in the air.

### Lobster Supplies Destroyed.

MESSAGE FROM BONNE BAY.

All the supplies for the lobster fishery were destroyed in the recent disastrous fire at Bonne Bay. This information was contained in a message to the Prime Minister to-day. The message states that R. A. Templeton who is the chief supplier for the lobster fishery, is sending a large supply of cans and other incidentals to Bonne Bay to enable the men to prosecute this fishery without any delay. The entire business section of the settlement was destroyed. Fifty-eight buildings, nine of which were dwelling houses, were burned. There is no present destitution.

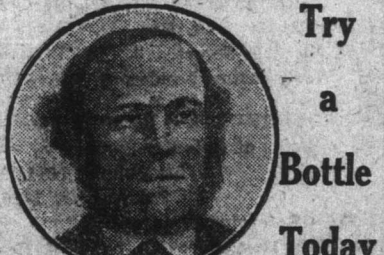

### Turning Artillery Into Implements of Industry.

LE CREUSOT, FRANCE.—A group of American bankers, now visiting this part of the department of Saone-et-Loire were shown to-day over the celebrated local iron and steel works by Charles Schneider, the director of the enterprise. The visitors were astonished at the successful transformation of the various plants from a war to a peace basis. The section devoted to the making of heavy artillery during the war is now turning out daily 35 locomotives, and the factories which not long ago produced light artillery are to-day making turbine engines. A total of 28,000 workmen is employed in the Le Creusot works.
