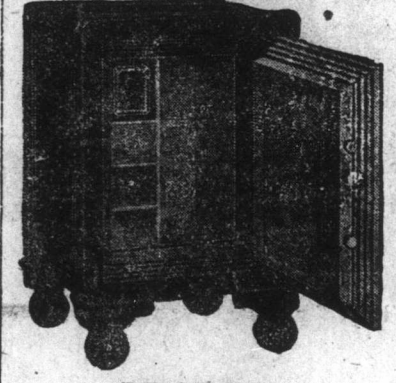

## French Fisherman Rescued.

ASTRAY FROM SCHOONER SIXTY HOURS.

Two French fishermen, picked up on the Grand Banks by the American schooner Marshall, Capt. John Marshall, of Gloucester, Mass., arrived in North Sydney on Saturday evening from Canoe, where they were landed, says the North Sydney Herald of July 11th. The two young men, Francis Estrelaut and Celestin Yungue of St. Solent, France, are members of the crew of the barque Porto, of St. Malo. They got separated from their ship during a heavy fog on the Grand Banks and were at sea for two days and a night before being picked up by the Marshall. The Marshall took the two men to Canoe, where they landed and came from there to North Sydney, reporting to the French consul, M. Lacroix, on their arrival here. They are at present guests at the Albert Hotel. M. Lacroix has arranged to send the two young men to St. Pierre from where they will rejoin the Porto. They will leave to-morrow by S.S. Pro Patria.
