### Naval Treaty is Thought Unfair.

FRENCH FOREIGN AFFAIRS COMMITTEE ASKS FOR MODIFICATIONS.

PARIS, March 24—The Committee on Foreign Affairs last night asked Premier Poincare to begin approach to other Governments regarding modifications and reservations on the Washington naval treaty.

After considering the report on the treaty throughout the day, the committee decided it could not recommend reservations, since the French Constitution does not give the right to Parliament to change treaties. Nevertheless, it could not recommend ratification, because it considered the treaty unfair to France in several ways. The naval treaty committee's request does not mean an actual refusal to ratify the treaty, although it obviously does not intend to ratify it in its present form.

An official statement minimizes the action as much as possible, pointing out that Premier Poincare has been requested to start negotiations to modify only "if this is an opportune time." It is, nevertheless, apparent that if the time is not opportune, the treaty will simply have to wait until Quai D'Orsay decides on an opportune time.

### The Rialto of Venice.
