OF NEWMARKET PLATE.
LONDON, Oct. 8.—Miss U. S. Walter Earl's Hogier, ridden by Miss Eileen Joel, won the 216th running of the Newmarket Town Plate race. G. D. Bennett's Poohbah, ridden by Miss Iris Rickaby, was second. Eight ran.

Another girl jockey, Betty Tanner, finished last in the field of five on Skylark. Third place was taken by a male jockey on W. Jarvis' horse Frooked.

Miss Joel put Hogier in the lead 200 yards from the finish and came away to win by two lengths, while four lengths separated the second and third. After the race she was presented with a silver cup subscribed by the townspeople.

Industrial Norway
Norway, for its population, is the most industrious fish producing country in the world, and she knows how to prepare fish for export in ways that enable her to sell her products at fair prices all over the world. Last year Norway exported 360,000,000 kroner worth of fish. That is, about \$70,000,000. At Norway prices her total catch for 1924 was only valued at 100,000,000 kroner, or about \$20,000,000. So she added greatly to the value of her fish produce by preparing it for foreign markets.

Norway catches about 500,000 tons of fish annually, herring furnishing about 60 per cent. of this weight. Canada's catch in 1923 was about 380,000 tons, with a larger percentage of high priced fish like salmon, halibut and lobsters. But Canada's export of fish in 1923 was only \$27,000,000—not half the export of Norway.

Of the total value of Norway's catch 50 per cent. is represented by cod. Of Canada's total catch the value represented by cod is about 10 per cent. Of Norway's value, herring represents about 28 per cent; of Canada's only 3 1/2 per cent. Whereas fish other than cod and herring make up 86 1/2 per cent. of the value of Canada's catch, these other fish only make up 24 per cent. of the value of Norway's catch. Cod and herring bring high prices; it takes a lot of them to run up values by the tens of millions. Norway makes up a very large part of her big export values by special treatment of varieties of fish which are by no means so prolific in her waters as in the waters of Canada. And she sells her specially prepared fish right here in this country which has the finest fisheries in the world. Norwegian tinned fish of various kinds may be seen in the windows or on the shelves of groceries all over Canada. Some enterprise is required by a country like Norway to sell fish in Canada.

A total of 100,000 persons in Norway find employment in the fisheries during some seasons of the year, as compared with about 70,000 in Canada. Most fishermen in Norway, like many in Canada, combine farming with fishing; but over 25,000 make fishing their sole occupation. Nearly all the fishermen are members of co-operative societies, or included in the operations of some profit-making plan.

Ford Makes First Sale of Airplane
CRAFT FLIES TO NEW YORK CARRYING KNOCKED DOWN TRUCK.

DETROIT, Oct. 8.—An all metal monoplane, bearing on its side the trade mark hitherto identified with the flivver, flew out of Detroit Wednesday afternoon, carrying in its freight compartment a knocked down automobile truck with which it will deliver itself.

"No. 1" was painted on the tail of the craft. It was Henry Ford's first airplane sale.



Aspirin Braces up Cut Flowers

Experiments have confirmed the fact that cut flowers may be prevented from fading by giving them an aspirin tablet. The experiments were conducted with chrysanthemums. The treated blooms outlasted the untreated by three days. Flowers which were badly wilted were given fresh water and an aspirin tablet. They revived in two hours, looking as fresh as they did when picked. The leaves, however, remained wilted. The aspirin acts as an antiseptic, interfering with the enzyme which causes the clogging of the stem at its cut surface.

Attempt Fails

REINDEER TAKEN TO BAFFIN LAND IN 1921, DIE.
OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—Failure has attended the attempt to pasture Lapland reindeer on Baffin Land, according to advices from the Arctic expedition. Private interests in 1921 took six hundred reindeer to this district and of this number only seven are alive.

The failure is attributed to the lack of wooded country and absence of accustomed shelter. While reindeer are not suited to the district, it is thought caribou will survive and propagate there if feeding grounds are established, while the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Craig Harbor report that musk oxen are comparatively tame and subject to domestication.

American Bishop Guilty of Heresy

SENTENCE WILL BE PASSED IN THE NEAR FUTURE.
NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 8.—The house of Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America to-day approved the finding of a court convicting Bishop William Montgomery Brown of heresy. More than two hours was occupied in executive session and Bishop Brown addressed the House of Bishops on his case. It was understood that the vote was 85 to 11 in favor of approving the court's finding.

The next step in the "Brown case" must be taken by the presiding bishop, the Right Reverend Ethelbert Talbot, Bishop of Bethlehem. The presiding Bishop was notified by the House of Bishops of its approval and he may pass sentence at his leisure. No date was set, it was said, for pronouncement of sentence which would prevent the convicted Bishop from exercising the functions of his office.
