fair ground.
A BOOBY ACCIDENT happened to Dr.
Tamblin, of Garrafax, last week. He
was discovered lying stunned by the side
of the road, near Douglass, and his horse
and empty vehicle were found a little
further on. The doctor suffered con-
siderably from the effects of the accident
for a day or two, but is now better.
FARM SOLD.—Messrs J. & R. Reabeing,
about to start for California, sold the
north-west half of lot 31 and south-east
half of lot 32, on Eramosa, (207 acres)
to James S. Armstrong for \$12,000.
This is a large stone dwelling and new
frame bank barn 70x72 feet on the prem-
ises.
On Saturday night Mr. Wm Owen's
barn on the 4th con. Peel, was burned
down. Mr. Owen lately bought a farm
to the west of that which he now resides,
upon which was a log barn. About 450
bushels was put into the barn this season.
There is a small insurance on the build-
ing.
A CUTTHROAT.—A most villainous act
was perpetrated a few days ago. Mr.
Hope, 9th Con. Peel, had been using his
horses in the morning, but rain coming
on, he turned them out into the field,
and upon going in the afternoon to hitch
them up, one of his working horses, a
valuable animal, was found lying quite
dead with his throat cut.
DURING the present summer in West
Garrafax many farmers have had a
large number of sheep killed by dogs:
David Small losing five, Hugh Thomson
eight and one badly wounded, John Al-
fison nine in one night, Mr. Dobbins all
he had, Mr. Short on the east side of
the river, all he had but one, Messrs.
Johnson & Thomson two, and several
others a greater or less number. Mr. J.
Gerrie, who had his sheep closed up,
seeing two dogs (one black, the other
brown) prowling about, warned his
neighbors to be on the watch. The
black dog was killed, since which time no
further depredations have been com-
mitted.
Y. M. C. A.—The regular weekly meet-
ing of the Y. M. C. A. was held last night.
A committee was appointed to confer
with the joint committee of the Sons of
Temperance and of the Good Templars,
on the best means of promoting the Tem-
perance cause, said Committee to report
to Association before any important ac-
tion is taken. The proprietors of the
billiard saloons having petitioned the
Council to extend the hours during which
they may keep open their saloons, a com-
mittee was appointed to draft and circulate

late among the ratepayers a petition
praying the Council not to extend the
time. The literary exercises consisted
of the reading by the Editor, Mr. Cooley,
of a manuscript magazine, consisting of
interesting articles under the titles: "The
Answer by Fitz," "My soul and I," "a se-
lection from Whittier 'Dunies, and how
to perform them'" and "The poetry of
life."
IMPORTED RAMS.—Wm. Whitelaw, Esq.,
of Paisley Block, has just received by the
Alban line, two Leicester rams, consigned
to him by a friend in Scotland. They
arrived in Guelph on Wednesday in good
condition, and are fine specimens of the
Leicester breed. One of them is for Mr.
Oliver, of Dumfries. They were both
purchased at the late great sale of rams
at Kelso. The one belonging to Mr.
Whitelaw is from the celebrated Rock
Flock of Mr. Bosanquet, Northumber-
land, being the same breed as the one
shown by him which took the first prize
this year at the Guelph Central, Provin-
cial and Hamilton Exhibitions. Mr.
Oliver's is from Mr. Foster's flock,
Billingham, Northumberland, whose
sheep were very successful prize takers
this year at the Highland Agricultural
Society's show at Stirling. The great in-
terest taken by Mr. Whitelaw in improv-
ing the breed of sheep is praiseworthy,
and we hope the heavy outlay he has
been at will be amply repaid.

Yacht Races in New York.

London, Oct. 10.—Sir Samuel Baker
and wife have arrived in England.
DUBLIN, Oct. 8.—The Irish Agricul-
tural Labourers' Union, in the event of
the Government failing to settle the ques-
tion of waste lands in Ireland, have de-
cided to emigrate for the United States
en masse.
LONDON, Oct. 10, 3 a. m.—The Car-
lists profess to have received information
that their general, Olio, on the 6th de-
feated and routed the army of General
Moxnes near Cirauqui, and compelled it
to retreat, leaving behind a large number
of dead and wounded.
Paris, Oct. 9.—The specie in the
Bank of France increased two million
francs during the past week.
New York, Oct. 9.—The ocean yacht
races for yachts, pilot-boats, schooners,
and smacks began to-day. The course
is from the anchorage off Owl's Head
Bay Ridge to and around light ship on
Five Fathom Bay to Cape May. The
following started:—Yachts—Alarm, Olio,
Eva, and Dreadnaught; pilot-boats—
Widgen, James W. Elwell, Thomas No-
2, and J. W. Elwell.
working schooners—W. H. Van Name,
and Reindeer; smacks—Wallace, and
Blackford. A start was made at 3:13 p.
m., Olio getting off first, Eva second,
next in order Enchantress and Alarm.
The position of the competing yachts off
Long Branch was as follows:—Enchant-
ress, Ohio, Dreadnaught, Alarm, E. Va-
name, Mary Fish, Widgen, T. Ne-
gas, Reindeer, W. Blackford, pilot boat
No. 2, and J. W. Elwell.
The morning session of the Catholic
Total Abstinence Union was occupied in
passing resolutions of sympathy with the
Pope in his afflictions, and condemning
the action of the German Government in
expelling the Jesuits. The treasurer re-
ported a surplus of about \$895. Father
Byrne, of New Jersey, was elected presi-
dent for the ensuing year.
At the session of the Evangelical Alli-
ance in Olivet Chapel, Rev. Narayan
Shesadro, of Bombay, India, was intro-
duced. He said:—That I am a foreigner is
most certain; my colour betrays me. He
spoke of the degrading character of the
castes prevalent in India. The influence
of Christianity in England and this coun-
try astonished him. India has 240 mil-
lions of people. This country is great;
but India is greater; the resources of
this country are great; of India inex-
haustible. Speaking of the European
residents, who since the introduction of
railroads and telegraphs have increased
prodigiously, he said as a class they
are a worthless, whiskey-drinking peo-
ple. Their example is detrimental to the
cause of Christianity. He recommended
an immigration of sober, steady me-
chanics, whose influence would be favor-
able. He had no doubt of the final tri-
umph of Christianity in India.
New York, Oct. 10.—Weather clear and
cool.
Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 9.—The work-
men of the South-west Foundry struck
to-day, in consequence of the proprietor
insisting upon a reduction of 20 per cent.
of mechanics and 15 per cent. per diem
of labourers. The South-west Foundry
is one of the largest industrial establish-
ments in the city, and employs nearly six
hundred hands.
The South Huron Election.
Mr. Case has issued his address to the
electors of the South Riding. It is ex-
tremely non-committal in its character
and, occupying little space, it contains
just as little to indicate Mr. Case's poli-
tical principles. He promises to sup-
port all measures of "real Reform." As
his views of "real Reform," are prob-
ably similar to those of M. C. Cameron
C. J. Rykert, and other Tories, that is to
turn out the present Ontario Govern-
ment at the earliest favorable moment,
we do not for a moment fancy that the
electors of South Huron will put it in
his power to vote against a Government
which has administered the affairs of
this province so wisely and well.
Mr. Case, or rather his friends for him,
are anxious to repudiate any connection
with the sale of the Pacific Railway char-
acter. This won't do. Until the Tory
party in Ontario withdraw their support
from the Ministry purchased by Sir
Hugh Allan, people are not to be blamed
if they regard every Tory candidate,
whether for the Commons or Local house,
with suspicion. If the Tory party be-
lieve Sir John A. Macdonald and his col-
leagues innocent of the charges brought
against them, why not repudiate them
in the present contest? The truth is they
are all tarred with the same stick; bribery
and corruption are the only means by
which they can sustain themselves in
power.
THE REV. DR. WALLACE, of Edinburgh,
who has been charged with preaching
and publishing erroneous doctrines in
reference to the resurrection and other
points, has expressed regret that from
himself somewhat unguardedly on the
points in question, but avers that he did
not and does not hold opinions at all in
opposition to those teaching of the stan-
dard of his Church. The Presbytery are
to consider the whole matter, and it is
generally understood that the diffi-
culty will be amicably settled.

Guelph Trade with the United States.
The consular agent in this town, Mr.
Jessopp, handed us on Wednesday a
statement of the quantity of merchandise
exported from Guelph to the U. S., the
invoices of which passed through the
agency. From this statement it appears
that the total value of these exports was
over a third of a million dollars, the
exact figures being \$385,801-
79. The heaviest item was flour,
of which over thirteen thousand
barrels were exported, value \$38,184;
then comes wool, 112,634 lbs., value
nearly fifty thousand dollars; then malt,
nearly 40,000 bushels, value \$28,855; next
sewing machines, 3,262, nearly \$25,000;
cattle, 479 head, value \$22,000 odd;
butter, over 120,000 lbs., value
\$18,585; fax, 117,487 lbs., value fifteen
thousand dollars; sheep, nearly fifteen
hundred, value nearly fifteen thousand
dollars; hams, 4,295, value nearly four-
teen thousand dollars; oatmeal, nearly
fourteen thousand dollars worth. Hops,
eggs, and horses figure up about nine
thousand dollars worth each; beef,
calves, and pigs from three to four
thousand dollars value each; watch case
springs, over two thousand dollars for
305; sundries, \$7,987. The remaining
articles in the list, varying in value from
\$1,207 to \$297, are barley, calf-skins,
organs, iron scraps, peas, and tow.
These figures show that an active
and important trade is done be-
tween Wellington County and our south-
ern neighbours. May it go on increas-
ing.

James A. Saxon, a well-known and
wealthy banker of Canton, Ohio, gave his
son a note for \$5,000 last week, payable
one year from date, provided that he (the
son) does not use tobacco during the pe-
riod named, and that he promises not to
do so for ever after.
A remarkable instance of the impossi-
bility of the travelling Briton was afford-
ed by the statement of Mr. Dodd, a mas-
ter at Elton College, who, being in the
train at the late fatal accident at Wigan,
so little about the eccentricities of the
carriage in which he was riding that he
did not know until he reached Scotland
that there had been any accident.
A gentleman of Verona has just died,
leaving a rather extraordinary will. He
bequeaths to the commune of his native
city the sum of 600,000 francs for the
endowment of a School of Chemistry, and
80,000 to the Society for the promotion
of Infantile Education on the Froebel
system. He also bequeaths a very ex-
cellent library, extremely rich in works

is Bentagodi, as appears when translated to
have been most appropriate, but his heirs
are said to have been discomfited at the
reading of his testament.
