Fight for Man's Life

Campbell, where are you?" "Here's Campbell, No. 32."
The voice was faint and far down under the debris. Quinn recognized it and he screamed for the other firemen to come to the rescue.

Chief Duff was badly injured in trying to dig out the man whose voice was fast sinking to a whisper. Battalion Chief O'Connor was overcome by smoke. Then it became evident that every man who was working to rescue the imprisoned second.

Acting Chief Duff ordered them out of the building. The firemen set to work to put out the flames. When the fire was under control a roll call of the firemen showed that Lennon, Campbell and Seifurt were missing. Hourly reports showed Lennon's body was found and it was night when the starting communications from Seifurt were heard.

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The firemen were big men, ambulance was called from the Hudson street hospital. A rubber stomach pump was run into a hole in the debris which the workers made, and so that Seifurt could apply his mouth to the funnel end of it. Through this he was given a stimulant and two cups of hot coffee. After receiving the stimulant Seifurt said he felt better and could wait with patience until his rescuers got him out.
Father Rafferty, of St. James church and Father Smith, the day department chaplain, were called to the building soon after Seifurt's voice was heard. Through the tube Father Smith heard the buried fireman make confession according to the rites of the Catholic church, of which Seifurt is a member, and gave him absolution. This took ten minutes, during which the rescuers stood reverently with bare heads. Meantime the west wall of the ruined building threatened to fall at any moment. Had it done so the priests and the rescuers would probably have shared Seifurt's fate, but they did not flinch. Work on the debris was now resumed. The priests remained and counseled the firemen to be brave and face whatever fate befell him.

Fire Commissioner Lantry appeared at the building and also a talk with the firemen. The buried man told him that he did not think he was hurt, but he felt cold and hungry. The Commissioner asked Seifurt about Campbell. Seifurt said he thought his comrade was lying eight or ten feet away, but he had heard nothing of him since they and Lennon were overwhelmed by the falling floors Sunday night.

The rescuers went on with their work which was of an extremely dangerous kind. Seifurt was lying under part of the flooring of the third story which had fallen through to a point about where the first floor had been. A loose mass of debris was heaped with the cellar floor for its base. This threatened to slide down and become more firmly packed, in which case Seifurt's slender chance of life would have gone in a moment, and part, if not all, of his rescuers would perish or be injured. And all the while the menace of the western wall of the building.

New York, Jan. 7.—Fireman John Seifurt, who was supposed to have been killed when two other firemen lost their lives in the fire in Roosevelt street last night, is alive but a prisoner hedged about by tons of debris in the ruins of Hill's paper warehouse. At midnight rescuers were making their way toward the man cautiously, lest he be killed when on the point of deliverance.
Seifurt made his presence known tonight to comrades who for nearly twenty-four hours had sought his corpse. He was stunned when his companions were killed, and for hours remained unconscious. When he regained his senses he heard workmen about him and cried out.
LATER—Seifurt was taken out of the ruins at 1.45 o'clock. It was said he will live. He was weak and his right leg was badly injured.

MACRI MUST MEET FATE ON GALLOWES

No Mercy to be Held out for the Winnipeg Murderer

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—At today's meeting of the cabinet, E. Guerin, of Montreal, was appointed superior court judge in succession to Judge Doherty, resigned.
It was decided to allow the law to take its course in the case of Macri, Winnipeg, who murdered a fellow countryman. Macri will therefore be hanged on January 15.
