

TURKEY IN THROES OF HARD FIGHT WITH ALBANIA

Insurgents, Buoyed With Victory, Have Decided to March On City of Keuprula

Situation is Considered Grave by the Members of Cabinet Now in Session

Rebels Making Forced Levies Upon Inhabitants and Assassinating Officers

LONDON, August 19.—The Albanian insurgents, according to the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Constantinople are not complete masters of Ushkup, but have decided to march on Saloniki. A detachment of 300 rebels already occupied the city of Keuprula. The receipt of this serious news, the correspondent says, "a hasty meeting of the Turkish cabinet was called and was resolved to resist the insurgents. The government telegraphed to the military authorities the necessary orders to this effect."

Situation is Grave

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FOUGHT PIRATES, TYPHOON AND ICEBERGS

British Tramp Ship Had Voyage Filled With Adventures on the Pacific

When Great Typhoon Raged, Saw Junks Blown Out of Water

New York, Aug. 19.—The British freight steamer Lothian arrived today from Manila after being away since February 17, 1911, during which period she had wandered to all parts of the world, travelling 60,000 miles, and carrying all kinds of cargoes from Arab pilgrims to salted Chinese quines and locusts. Her adventures included being captured by pirates, fighting a typhoon and being frozen in the ice in the Siberian seas.

Lothian's Voyage
The Lothian was commanded by Captain William J. Lockhart. In all she had a crew of thirty-five Chinamen and eight European officers and engineers. The story of the voyage was related to a Gazette correspondent today by First Officer Henry and corroborated by the captain and engineer's interviews.

Sailed by Pirates
The first serious adventure happened on November 12, when the Lothian was anchored off Woonsoo Bay, waiting to go up to Shanghai to unload a cargo of beetle nuts and luth gins from Djokjakarta. The night was cold and foggy. Wang, the house man, was keeping watch at the gangway, but did not notice a pirate junk creep along until it was too late. He was seized and gagged. A starboard watchman, Ming from Wu Chow, on the 31st Klang, 250 miles west of Canton, rounded the steaming crew and later they then down below after clipping off their queues with their keen double-edged swords.

After going through the ship and commandeering everything that was portable, including the sheet anchor and the captain's dog, Towser, who came on deck to see what was up, the pirates pulled away in their junk, which was loaded with loot, and disappeared the fog. The dawn of the next day two Chinese junk boats were sent off to catch and execute Chan Ho Wan and his band without any tedious preliminaries, the mate was killed.

Three weeks later, in December, the Lothian was frozen hard and fast in the harbor of Vladivostok, Siberia, for two weeks, and the entire crew was frost-bitten with the exposure and had to be thawed out in turns in front of the galley fire by Hon Wang, the cook. The Lothian managed to get clear of the harbor with the aid of two ice-breakers, belonging to the Russian government, used for naval purposes.

HIS SENTENCE A MISTAKE
Chicago, Aug. 19.—Sentence imposed on Samuel T. Warfield, a book agent found guilty of conspiracy to defraud Mrs. James A. Patten wife of the "Whisker King" through the sale of valuable books was reversed yesterday by the appellate court. The case was sent back for re-sentencing.

Warfield some time ago was found guilty by a jury of attempting to defraud Mrs. Patten out of \$20,000. His punishment was fixed at three years in the penitentiary and a \$2,000 fine. A writ of error was then taken out.

MARINES ARE SENT TO AID OF WEITZEL

Reach Corinto and Are Probably Now at the Disposal of American Minister

U. S. State Department Has No Sympathy With Rebellion in Nicaragua

Washington, August 18.—The collier Justin, the state department learned today, arrived at Corinto yesterday with 350 marines, under command of Major Smedley Butler, who reported at once to the senior officer, Captain Terhune, Commanding the garrison at Managua, who has been given full authority to deal with the military situation in Nicaragua as it affects American interests.

It is believed this marine force was at once dispatched to Managua, a six hour run over the railroad from Corinto. Because of delayed cable advice officials here can only conjecture what happened after the arrival of the marines in the Nicaraguan capital.
How this force has been used depends entirely upon the will of American Minister Weitzel, but as he has been protected to the rebels against the bombardment of Managua, filled as it is with women and children and non-combatants, it is believed he has driven the insurgents away from their positions and stopped the bombardment. If his force is not sufficient for this purpose officials feel sure he will hold the city until reinforcements from Panama or the bluejackets of the Denver, now en route to Corinto, can be placed at his disposal.

The state department has let it be understood that it does not propose to tolerate this lawless shelling and killing of helpless women and children, and the endangering of American lives and the seizure of American property. The officials are emphatic in pointing out that General Morúa, the head of the revolution, has completely alienated the sympathies of this government by his conduct of the rebellion.
Delayed cables received at the state department from American Minister Weitzel give a vivid picture of the conflict at Managua, which began Saturday morning, when General Zelaya, in command of the rebel forces around Managua, opened fire on the city from the vicinity of Momotombo.

Rebels Are Repulsed
At 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon Colonel Rostran and General Murillo attacked the penitentiary with infantry and rapid-fire guns in an attempt to liberate the prisoners, and at 8 o'clock 100 men, under cover of artillery, attempted to enter the city from the lake, but were repulsed and 25 of them were captured. Throughout the night firing continued at intervals. Of the rebels, General Morúa, commanding the force, was killed. The government forces under General Emilio Chamorro were about 3,500. The government firing line in the east, under command of General Belandier, faced Zelaya's division and received the brunt of the fire.

At 6 o'clock Monday morning Zelaya renewed the attack, being shell and solid shot for a three-inch rifle into the city at the rate of 20 an hour, directed principally toward the presidential palace. The rebels, however, reached the executive mansion and the president and his cabinet continued with their official duties. The American consul, however, fled to the American collector of general customs, were hit, and the residence of the German consul suffered severely. The American guard estimated that a total of 200 shells fell in the city, resulting in the death and wounding of 12 women and children.

During the bombardment General Thomas attempted to take the government position at La Loma by assault. The government, to which the government vigorously replied with the cannon and the fire from the men in the trenches.

Chamorro Mortally Wounded
The government's heavy guns were directed away from the city. After an engagement lasting two hours the fire of the government was compelled to the rebels to withdraw. Later they resumed firing upon the city and the government forces planted land mines along the shore of the lake, compelling the rebels to withdraw. Two of the government boats protected the lake front. Under the government's command, the forces retreated until evening, when they continued to drop shells into the city during the night.

The casualties are reported heavy, particularly among the rebels. The government captured 25,000 rounds of ammunition and two rapid-fire guns. Sunday, while Managua was under bombardment, the rebels were defeated at the town of Nandaimo, General Menes home.

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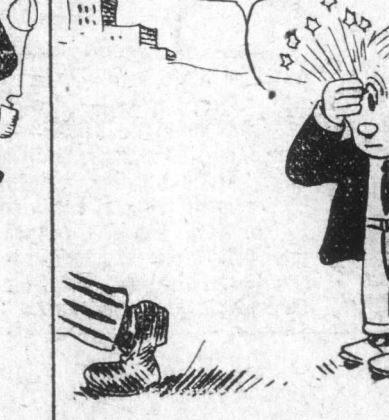

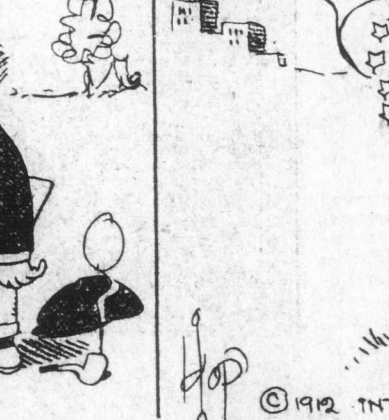

Probable That Road Will Run Into Minneapolis Yet, Says Erle D. Luce

Minneapolis, Minn., August 19.—The Canadian Northern Railroad is holding in abeyance plans to enter Minneapolis following the suspension of negotiations with the electric short line company to enter the city over a right of way purchased from Minneapolis to Robbinsdale. The Canadian Northern's action in suspending plans for extension is due to the fact that Canadian reciprocity did not pass. While the pact was pending the electric short line company purchased a right of way from the C.N.R. on the east side as far as Robbinsdale. This purchase was made exclusively for the use of the Canadian Northern, agents of the Canadian Northern having made it plain that the road would build immediately if the pact were passed, and would join in the building of railroad terminals.

IMMIGRATION INCREASING

Dominion Inspector White Says Rush From the United States Increasing

White, inspector of immigration agencies in the United States, says the immigration from the States is constantly increasing and the reports that the crop this year will make the whole world wonder has been instrumental in interesting wealthy farmers throughout the middle states with the result that there have been many private parties made up and the Canadian west toured with a view to either locating or investing. CHARLES E. GREEFFIELD CLAIMS THAT HE HAD SUICIDE PACT WITH EIGHT YEAR OLD CHILD

San Bernardino, Cal., Aug. 18.—Charles E. Greeffield, aged 25, who killed his 8-year-old stepdaughter, Vivian Greeffield, in a rooming house at Venice Tuesday afternoon, was captured in Guyanaka today. He will be taken to Los Angeles tomorrow.

Seated in his cell, Greeffield freely admitted that he had killed the girl. His confession was made in a voice that clearly indicated, officials say, that the man was not insane. It was said, however, he was laboring under a terrific strain.

Agreed to Jump Off Pier
"When we left home to go to Venice we had agreed to jump off the end of the pier into the ocean. After we reached the pier we saw too many people there, and decided to go to a rooming house, where we agreed I should cut her throat and then end my own life."

"After securing a room I drew the razor from my pocket. Just as I was about to draw the blade across Vivian's throat she looked up at me, put her arms around my neck and kissed me, and said, 'We will both soon be gone.'"

Wanders in Streets
At this point Greeffield's voice became little more than a mumble. Recovering his composure, the prisoner said he knew but little of what happened after he killed the girl. He declared that he walked to Los Angeles that night, wandered about the streets for several hours, and then started to walk to San Bernardino, where, his father lives.

The proprietor of a store at Edwanda recognized Greeffield from pictures he had seen in the Los Angeles papers when the fugitive asked for a loaf of bread early today, and notified the authorities.

JEALOUS WOMAN MURDERS HER RIVAL

Mrs. Leola Jones Shoots Mrs. Alva F. Cave, in Whom Her Husband Was Interested

Nashville, Tenn., August 18.—Mrs. Leola Jones is a prisoner in the county jail here, charged with the murder of Mrs. Alva Frances Cave, widow of "Steve" Cave, and daughter-in-law of the Rev. R. Lin Cave, pastor of the Woodland Street Christian Church and chaplain-general of the United Confederate Veterans. The motive behind the killing of Mrs. Cave appears to be jealousy as Mrs. Jones' husband's name has been connected with Mrs. Cave by the neighborhood gossip of North Nashville on several occasions.

Last night Mrs. Cave was sitting in her front hall when the front gate opened and Mrs. Jones walked toward the house. No words were spoken and as Mrs. Jones approached, she fired twice, both shots taking effect in the region of Mrs. Cave's heart. Notwithstanding her bedroom and there fell dead across the bed. Mrs. Cave was 30 years of age and pretty. She leaves a little girl, five years of age, and a son, two years old.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS FELT IN ARIZONA

Albuquerque, N. M., August 18.—According to a dispatch received this evening, Williams, Arizona, 400 miles west of here, was severely shaken by an earthquake this afternoon. The shock lasted from 2:05 to 2:10 p. m. The shocks were felt as far east as Winslow 100 miles. Holbrook, a town nearby also, was severely shaken. Buildings rocked and windows broke but it is not thought that any lives were lost.

Washington, August 18.—Pronounced earth shocks at a distance of about 1,200 miles were recorded the seismograph at Georgetown university today beginning at 4:25 p. m. and lasting five and a half minutes. The disturbance which is not believed to have been particularly severe, probably occurred within the United States.

JAPANESE BLOOD A BAR TO AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP

Father German, Mother an Oriental, Youth is Held to be Not "Free White"

Seattle, August 18.—Although Albert H. Young, a law student at the University of Washington, is a subject of the German emperor, he cannot become a citizen of the United States because his mother was a Japanese. Such was the decision today of United States District Judge Edward E. Cushman, who took the same view of the case as Judge Cornelius H. Hanford, who recently resigned and who had denied Young's application for citizenship.

Young's father was a German who married a Japanese woman at Yokohama. Their child was born in that city, but on land under the protection of German flag, making him a German. Young contended that as a German he was entitled to naturalization in the United States, but Naturalization Examiner John Speed Smith resisted his application, under section 1563 of the revised statutes, which provides that only aliens who are free white persons or who are of African nativity or descent may become naturalized. Young maintained that he was entitled to be classed as "free white," but the court ruled that his mother having been a Japanese barred him from citizenship.

POLICE SEEK MISS LOVE

Boston, Aug. 18.—The Boston police, acting on the request of Commissioner of Public Safety, Barnett, of Haverhill, this afternoon began a hunt for Miss Margaret Love of this city, known on the stage as Margaret Trevor, to see if she can throw any light on the attempted shooting of Thomas Nickerson, manager of the Haverhill Gas Light Company. Nickerson was fired at twice by a mysterious woman in the office in Haverhill yesterday.

It was Miss Love who recently sued Nickerson for \$20,000, alleging breach of promise to marry. The police claimed that when Miss Love learned of the engagement of Nickerson to Phyllis Sherwood, of the "Allas Jimmy Valente" company she went to Haverhill to attempt to effect a reconciliation. Miss Love spent last night with friends living in Hollis street, it is said.
