

## Our English Letter.

Touching References to the Recent Royal Brevement.

Testimony to the Worth of the Late Cardinal Manning.

The Remarkable Projects of Britain's Railway King.

Government Insurance for Workmen—Dreadful Implements of War—The Progress of the Church Union Movement.

(From ADVERTISER'S English Correspondent.)

LONDON, Feb. 11, 1892.

The land is in mourning. The pestilence which for the past month has been stalking through our country sweeping off its thousands has just smitten down two of the highest in the land—Prince Albert Victor (eldest son of the Prince of Wales), and Cardinal Manning—the Prince in his prime and the Cardinal in his very old age.

In the former case, as you will have already learned from your dispatches, the fatality is peculiarly sad. Just betrothed to the popular Princess Victoria Mary, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Teck—all the arrangements made for a magnificent wedding on the happy occasion and the Princess of Wales at Windsor—heartily congratulations and rich presents flowing in from all parts of the British empire and from foreign lands—all England rejoicing in the proposed nuptials and anticipating a general gorgeous and brilliant display as the imposing procession made its way, amid ringing cheers, through the bannered streets of the metropolis—when suddenly and silently death stepped in, and in a few short days, lays the young Princess low, dashes the cup of nuptials from the bright plans and purposes and blights all the fond hopes of the royal families, and the bride-expectant, now the virgin-widow, lays her bridal-wreath upon the coffin of the Prince to whom she had been so recently and so happily espoused. The nation's heart is more than touched—it is deeply stirred by this tragic event. There is universal lamentation. Deepest sympathy is felt for the aged Queen (for this was her favorite grandson) for the Prince and Princess of Wales in the loss of their first-born by so terribly swift and unexpected a bereavement, and almost most of all, certainly tenderest of all, for the young Princess May, whose heart has been so sorely crushed at the very moment of intensest gladness. When she told her he was dead, she could not believe it; she implored him to speak to her once more; and as they bore her tenderly out of the chamber of death, she cried out, "Oh! Eddie, Eddie!" (his pet name.) That shriek of the anguished young Princess will not soon be forgotten by the nation. It is the "one touch of nature that makes the world a kin." Never in all my experience have I known such deep and general sorrow.

Cardinal Manning, too, was held in very high respect for his true catholicity of spirit and for his practical and lively interest in the welfare of the working classes. In many Church of England pulpits, yes, and in the pulpits of many Nonconformist churches, too, many very respectful words were heard yesterday in reference to the wisdom and the courage of the deceased prelate, which allowed no high walls of ecclesiasticism to limit his philanthropic efforts in the temperance cause and in the dockyards strikes. In connection with the latter movement no one was more prudent in speech, more influential in counsel, or more valiant in action.

A noteworthy fact in connection with the present is that almost all persons past 60 years of age who have been attacked with influenza have succumbed. Of course, this is easily accounted for. The mention of this age, however, reminds me that our Tory Government, at the instigation of Mr. Chamberlain, the coming leader of the Discontented Liberals, is about to launch a decoy bait to attract workingmen's votes at the election, which is not many weeks off. I refer to a scheme of national insurance in the interest of the poor. It has been found that the great majority chargeable on the poor law provision of workhouses consists of men and women over 60 years of age. It is extremely difficult for such persons to get employment, and if they have not saved anything, they are utterly destitute, and are driven by want to the workhouse. Many philanthropists have proposed a remedy in the shape of compulsory or voluntary insurance from early life. Mr. Chamberlain has considered these schemes, adopted their best points and formulated a plan which he proposes (1) a preliminary deposit, (2) \$5 a year or about 10 cents a week, (3) at the age of 65 allowance of \$65 a year to begin. I need not give all the details, but such are the main proposals. It will, I am sure, be of immense advantage in the encouragement of thrift and the consequent diminution of poverty.

Sir E. Watkin is our present railway king. His name bulks before the public eye like that of Brunel and Stephenson, and Hudson did in the last generation. There is great faith in him. The people think that he can achieve what he purposes. Then he has a faith in himself which nothing can daunt. All successful men have. Yet this self-confidence is a whole diameter away from self-conceit. The latter is an invariable sign of weakness, the former of strength. And when a man has faith in himself and the people have faith in him, you have the most favorable conditions for success. Barring all accidents, he is sure to win. Now, Sir Edward Watkin is just that kind of man. He has personal magnetism about him. He is inculcated others with his own faith. He is a Methodist. He was brought up in a Methodist. Now, Connexion Sunday school at Stockport, near Manchester. He is now the managing director of great railways. He is doing his best to gain access for the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway to London. We have now five great railways to and from the provinces—the Great Western, the Great Eastern, the Great Northern, the London and North Western (the most powerful of all), and the Midland. He wishes to have a sixth, and the five oppose, and to do the residents of the beautiful suburbs (St. John's Wood) where he proposes to build his London depot. He will have great difficulty in overcoming this formidable opposition. He is also the projector of the

channel tunnel. He has proved its feasibility by his borings at both ends, but the military experts protest most vigorously against making a sub-way for the French and endangering England by destroying her insularity. You may pool the apprehensions of Gen. Wolsley and his colleagues; you may endeavor to minimize the risk by talking of electricity, and burying debris down deep as you may proclaim the advantages of facilitating continental traffic and prophesy a pacific era when men "shall hang the trumpet in the hall, and study war no more"; but it is all in vain. Neither a Liberal Government will sanction the proposed tunnel. They dare not. The millennium has not yet dawned. When it does, then build your tunnel on a lease of 999 years. Meanwhile Sir Edward is boring inland, and has discovered coal; and if found to be workable, as expected, much of the south of England will become a great coal field. This may spoil the physical aspect of Kent—"the garden of England"—but it will be of immense advantage in cheapening coal for metropolitan supply. Sir Edward is also proposing to erect the Watkin tower in the north of London to rival the Eiffel and the Babel towers. A new and important railway is also projected to run from Liverpool to the east coast—the first railway to run right across England from east to west. This will provide new routes and outlets for trade, and will greatly facilitate travel to the numerous seaside resorts on the opposite coasts in the summer season.

Speaking about the millennium, it seems to me that it ought to come soon, or when war breaks out, as it is expected to do this spring, there will be wholesale slaughter on the battle field. A breech-loading rifle has just been invented, which is warranted to discharge nine shots per second. Another which is guaranteed to pierce two mattresses and two planks through at a distance of 4,000 feet. With this, a soldier can carry 100 smokeless cartridges and fire five almost at once. The new German artillery throws shells charged with a secret powder whereby splinters of the burst missile will cover a circle with a diameter of 300 feet (formerly only 50 feet). A battery of this new death-dealing artillery would soon annihilate an entire division of an army. When will the workings of all civilized countries form a great peace confederation and refuse to go and be mowed down? This is a far more important question than wages, hours, etc., which so much occupy and fret the Knights of Labor. It cannot be long before there is a great uprising of the masses in the interests of peace against the jingoism of the classes. Let the masses produce let the classes fight. War would soon cease.

After a five hours' conference at Adelaide, representing the Wesleyan, the Primitive Methodist and the Bible Christians of Australia the following resolutions were unanimously passed: 1. Organic union desirable. 2. Affirmation of growing desire in the churches named for efforts to be made to bring about union. 3. The time has come, as shown by the action of the Ecumenical Conference, for practical steps to be taken. 4. Resolved to use all proper means to further it. 5. Request to each Australian conference to send a delegate to arrange a basis of union, etc. We hope this movement will be successful.

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## THE LAST CITY ELECTION.

Testimony as to the Manner in Which Mr. Hyman's Friends Conducted It.

A good many innuendoes and false statements have been circulated by Mr. Carling's friends with regard to the manner in which the last Dominion election was fought. But it is a noticeable fact that those upon whom the allegations are fastened are generally anonymous scribblers, who have not the manliness to come out into the open. When names are mentioned we all know how speedily the slanders are met and disposed of. There were the unfounded charges made the election eve of the Free Press, which had to publish a full and complete apology, in which it said:

"The trial, at which the petitioners had an opportunity of proving, is now over, and during its progress it has not been shown that the gentlemen named were guilty of the charges mentioned in the particulars referred to by the Free Press."

It is, therefore, only fair to the gentlemen named to say that they are free from all personal credit practices. The Free Press is glad to be able to entirely exonerate them from complicity in the alleged wrongdoing, as it is satisfied that an error was made in placing these charges in the particulars."

Many other citizens were traduced in the same "hall of particulars," as the Free Press characteristically calls it, by "an error." Even ministers of the Gospel were charged with participating in bribery. It is needless to say that there was no truth in the indictment, but the fact that such methods were resorted to is but a proof of the desperation of the petitioners.

If further testimony of the fairness with which Mr. Hyman's responsible supporters conducted the election were needed, it would be found in the declaration of the Toronto Telegram, an independent Conservative newspaper, which, after reviewing the evidence, remarked that the London contest "was fought as fairly as such contests ever are." The same Conservative paper further added:

"Canada would be better off if there were no graver impurities in its politics than those revealed at the London election trial."
