EAST LONDON.**Anniversary Sermons of King Street**

Presbyterian Church.

Yesterday being the anniversary of King

Street Presbyterian Church, Rev. Dr.

Laing, of Dundas, occupied the pulpit

morning and evening. In the morning he

took for his text Matthew, xvi, 24-28:

"Let him deny himself and take up his

cross and follow me." He said if men con-
tinued to take a natural view of Christ's
ligion they could never understand why
it was necessary for Christ to die, for the
mind of man is carnal. They forget that
sacrifice is necessary to further the king-
dom of Christ; besides, men say that all
that is necessary to establish a kingdom
and make men better is education, good
laws and public opinion. But the Scriptures
teach us that it is wrong to suppose that
prohibitory laws will elevate humanity;
nothing will do this but law in conjunction
with the Gospel of Christ, one of the founda-
tions of which is "truth." As soon as
men are willing to look at things just as
they are, without prejudice, then truth will
predominate. The next is "right." Some
say anything done to bring about a good
end is all that is necessary, such as "the
end justifies the means." The kingdom of
heaven shall be established on three great
laws—"truth," "right" and "love." How
are we going to carry these into every
day life? By bearing tribulations
patiently by work and prayer. Christ said
we are to do likewise. This prepares
a man for his heavenly home. Some
people would like to get into heaven by
folding their arms and die as if on a to-
boggan; they hope to get there but do not
wish to work. Do the right, no matter
what it is, for your reward is great. Why
should we deny ourselves? Because we de-
pend on Christ. Man's life depends on the
enjoyment in accordance with the Gospel.
How long is this life compared with eter-
nity? The rich ungodly man has prepared
no home for himself but spent all he had in
this world. "For what shall a man give in
exchange for his soul?" The Scriptures tell
us there is no chance for a worldly man to
enter heaven, then there would be some ex-
cuse for people to shun the offer of salva-
tion, but we have to give an account of the
deeds done in the body. If death ended
everything the bearing of the cross and fol-
lowing Christ would not be necessary, but
Christ says the time is at hand, also is the
day of salvation.

In the evening he took Ezekiel, xxxiii,

11: "As I live, saith the Lord God, I have
no pleasure in the death of the wicked; but
that the wicked turn from his ways and live;
turn ye, turn ye from your evil ways, for
why will ye die, oh house of Israel?" The
reverend gentleman gave an eloquent dis-
course on this subject, which was very in-
teresting to the large audience that listened
to him.

At the Adelaide Street Baptist Church

yesterday Rev. H. C. Speller, the pastor,
made special reference in his morning dis-
course to the great loss sustained by the
denomination in the death of the late Prof.
McGregor, of McMaster Hall. Mr. Speller
took for his text the latter part of verse 22,
Mark xi: "Have faith in God." The
reverend gentleman started out with the
proposition that no greater disaster could
befall the church than for it to be
imagined that the success of God's work de-
pends upon itself. It was the natural
tendency of men to put faith in intellectual
ability, but without the aid of faith no gifts
were too good to be employed in the
Master's service, the church must get the
impression that Christ is Lord to the glory
of God the Father; that he can take the
commonest, humblest things of life to do
his work. The little church at Jerusalem
pinned its faith on Stephen, and in the midst
of its usefulness he was taken from them.
This had been all through the history of
the church. The ablest and most success-
ful standard-bearers of the cross were often
cut down at the very time when it seemed
that they were most needed. As the
standard-bearers fall God puts the cross in
our hands and says the work must go on.
"Have faith in God." Inspired with faith,
let us lay hold of whatever work comes to
our hands, and in the name of God do it
with all the energy of one who knows not
the moment of his taking off. It matters
not who may begin the work or who may
continue it. Paul may plant, Apollus may
water, but it is God who giveth the in-
crease.
