CHICAGO, June 3.—Over half of the United States was simultaneously visited with rain last night, and the edge of the great spot of wet was made ragged with a cyclone. The condition of telegraph wires north, south, east and weat showed a state of affairs seldom if ever equaled. Soaking rains were in progress, accompanied with driving winds from here to New Orleans and stretching beyond St. Faul and Minneapolis in the north, and in the west for an indefinite distance.

Milwaukee reports severe electrical disturbances. Further northwest in the Dakotas many towns were cut off from telegraphic communication.

One of the most disastrous rain storms ever known in that section visited Darlington, Wis., last evening. The wind blew a hurricane, the rain came down in torrents and large hail stones fell. Considerable damage was done to crops and fruit.
