AS BIG AS A BALLOON. Fall of a Meteor at Council Bluffs—The Shock Shock the City.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, Nov. 28.—A large meteor fell, striking the eastern or southwestern part of the city at 11 o'clock last night. It appeared to be about the size of a balloon, and while it was in the heavens it was luminous and looked like a ball of fire, lighting up the whole city. Just before it struck the earth it exploded, and its fragments were scattered over several acres of ground. It being in the thinly settled part of the town no one was injured. Two minutes after the meteor fell there was a terrific shock, scarcely less severe than an earthquake, which shook nearly every building in the city and awakened nearly all of the slumbering inhabitants.

Bandits Behind the Bars. FORT SMITH, Ark., Nov. 28.—Four members of the Cook gang, Will Forris, Chas. Turner, Jesse Snyder and Thuman Baldwin, arrived here yesterday in charge of officers. The last named is the individual who has worked with the notorious Cook gang since it began operations under the pseudonym of "Skooter." "Skooter" has pleaded guilty to two charges of train robbing.

—Over \$3,000 of London West taxes for 1894 yet remain unpaid. —Josie Mills has arrived in the city and is staying at the Tecumseh. —The river at the forks was partly frozen over last night—the first time this winter. —Don't talk about the weather here being cold—it was 20° below zero in Winnipeg yesterday.

—Manager Break, of the street railway, is still in Detroit in connection with the big deal being made by Mr. Everett there. —The Western Hotel here has changed hands. Mr. Wm. Henderson, formerly of the Arlington House, Woodstock, has assumed charge. —Yenths are already making a practice of coating on the sidewalk on Dundas Street west of Ridout, much to the inconvenience and danger of pedestrians.

—The cost of maintaining the county jail for the quarter ending Sept. 30 is \$1,275 68. Of this the city pays 60 per cent—\$765 41—and the county the balance, \$510 27. —The County Orange Lodge of East Middlesex is already issuing invitations for the celebration under its auspices at London on July 12, 1895. The Orangemen of the county of Elgin have been invited. —Mr. Crowley, science master of the Ottawa Collegiate Institute, is inspecting the science department of the London Collegiate Institute, with the view of improving the equipment and the methods of teaching in the Ottawa Institute.

—Max O'Reil is a close observer, and has gone through the world with his eyes wide open. He has the happy knack of picturing in present phrases the little foibles he comes in contact with. It will interest all to hear him speak of the Englishman, Scotchman and Irishman at the Opera House tonight. —Wonderland will open to the public on Monday evening, Dec. 3. Manager Stewart has engaged a fine stock company to support Josie Mills. The opening play will be John A. Stevens' masterpiece, "Passion's Slave." W. C. Bellien, the scenic artist of the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, will prepare the scenery.

—The Dominion Grocers' Association held its annual meeting in the Toronto Board of Trade building yesterday. There were two delegates from Montreal, about half a dozen from Hamilton and one from London, besides Toronto grocery merchants. Matters pertaining to the trade were discussed, the meetings being secret. —George Stratford, Center Street, London West, was fined \$5 and costs by Justice Lacey last night for allowing his son to remain away from school. The offense came under the Truancy Act, and Truancy Officer Ward was the complainant. A number of parents in the village are showing indifference towards the law and the official is after them.

—In Toronto it is reported that H. A. Everett, of Cleveland, has resigned the vice-presidency of the Toronto Street Railway Company. The rumor is received with credence in well informed circles. The story is that Mr. Everett has sold all his stock in the concern and quietly withdrawn from his official position, as he did in the case of the Montreal Railway Company. —As will be seen by advertisement in another column, the London Trades and Labor Council hold a concert in the City Hall tomorrow evening. The object is to raise money to relieve the unemployed workmen in the city during the winter months. The price of the tickets is only 15 cents. No doubt a large number will avail themselves of the opportunity to help along such a worthy project.

—Guy Brothers' Minstrels will appear at the Grand Saturday, matinee and night. This well known minstrel company cannot be kept away from Canada for the reason of the popularity gained by them on their initial tour through the Dominion some years ago. They give a clean and bright show and have excellent specialties. This year they have added new features, which have gained them great praise from the press. They should have large houses. A Weekly Supply of Anti-Toxine. The medical practitioners of Ontario are manifesting considerable interest in the experiments connected with the new diptheria remedy, anti-toxine. Dr. P. H. Bryce, the secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, has taken steps to secure a weekly consignment of the serum, which will be distributed amongst several hospitals of the Province. Sufficient for the treatment of twelve patients will arrive weekly. It is now stated that it is diptheria, and not smallpox, as at first given out, which is epidemic in Rentree county. Diptheria has also broken out in Cavan township, Ontario county.

A Painful Accident. Wm. Finch, of 728 Queen's Avenue East, met with a very painful accident in front of the street car station at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, which will keep him up for many months. Finch is a driver, and had been on the west Dundas street trolley line since spring. He was only a spare man, but yesterday was placed on the regular list and was allotted a South London car. At the hour mentioned car No. 50 came eastward, and Finch was to relieve the driver, Frank Armstrong. He grasped the handle of the dashboard to step on the platform, but in some way lost his footing and fell to the ground. A second had hardly elapsed before a shout was heard and a half-dozen employees were on the scene. Finch was partly unconscious, and had to be carried into the office. A physician was hastily summoned, and it was found that the outside of Finch's left foot was badly lacerated and two bones broken. The car wheels had passed over it. The injured man also complained of intense pain in the right arm, and an examination showed that it also was broken near the wrist—the result of the fall. Several other minor injuries were received.
