Reported Variance Between Britain and the United States

Over Venezuelan Territory-The Monroe Doctrine Again.

St. Paul. Minn., Oct. 2.-The Pioneer Press today says: Moses E. Clapp left for New York last night to attend a hastily arranged meeting of the Manoa Company (Ltd.) to consider im-Britain and that the present Government of the former country would not be loth to avail itself of the moral, encroachment of the latter. Indeed it is said that the grant of the concession was a shrewd stroke of diplomacy of the Venezuelan President for the purpose of drawing the United States directly into action to force the Government of Great Britain to abandon her usurpation of territory in Venezuela. The syndicate have given notice that they will take possession of their territory within a month. But diplomatic correspondence on this subject between Washington and London has been active for some time past. President Cleveland and Secretary of State Olney are said to be one on the question States will act upon its own view of the dispute and enforce the Monroe doctrine. Thursday's meeting in New York, it is said, is called to consider the details of the possession of the land embraced in the concession.

FIVE WIDOWS AFTER THE BODY.

Oakwoods Cemetery Company Guarding th Remains of Thos. Holbrook. Chicago, Oct. 2 .- A temporary halt has been called in the war over the remains of Thomas Holbrook by the serving of an injunction issued late last Saturday night by Judge Haneey restraining the Oakwoods Cemetery

Company from making any further disposition of the remains until ordered to do so by the court. Holbrook is the colored man who was murdered by Carrie Stewart ar 153 Custom House Place Wednesday night, and whose remains five different women claimed on the ground of being his widow. One of these widows went so far as to secure a writ of replevin for the body of the deceased, but the officials of the cemetery refused to recognize the writ which was issued by a justice of the peace, the officials having been previously ordered by the public administrator not to turn the remains over to anybody until a brother of the murdered man arrived and straightened out the tangle in his

domestic affairs. The widow who had the writ of re plevin was so persistent in her demands that the cemetery officials had to employ an extra force of guards Saturday night to prevent the con-stable who had the writ from taking forcible possession of the remains. The injunction from the Circuit Court, however, had the effect of putting a stop to the scramble until the matter is decided in court. Holbrook had about \$1,000 in cash on his person at the time of his death, and the rival claimants are said to be anxious to get hold of this money.

WOMAN WITCHES.

Hudsonville, Mich., Oct. 2.-Drenthe is a little hamlet, near the south boundary of Ottawa county, and is settled by Hollanders, the greater part of whom are prosperous and worthy citizens. In the matter of superstitions Drenthe has few equals in the world. Pins, needles and horseshoes are in constant use to ward off the attacks of witches, while charms of every kind are worn to circumvent disease and

impending calamities. There is an embargo placed on black cats and watch-eyed horses. The feathers of black chickens are burned at regular intervals, to secure immunity from the invasions of the witches.

A son of a wealthy Holland baron is living, with his family, near the village; one night, not long since, their baby was suffering from the croup, which the parents attributed to an old woman, thought to be a witch. Pillows were searched for feather crowns, which were burned, but no relief was obtained for the little sufferer. Finally the father threw a live toad into the room of the supposed witch, after which the child got better, thus more firmly establishing their faith in the efficacy of their remedy.

One poor old woman is closely watched by her family and the neighbors. who believe her possessed of familiar spirits.

A Spanish Warship and a German Steamer Wrecked.

The Cruiser Comes to Grief in the Gulf of Guadiana.

The German Mail Steamer Uruguay Ashore-No Loss of Life in Either Case-Fatal Wreck on Nowtoundland's coast.

Havana Oct. 2.—Following close upon the loss of the Spanish schooner Barcastegnia, which sunk in collision with the Spanish merchant steamer Mortera off Moreo Castle, resulting in the drowning of Admiral Delgado Parejo, commander-in-chief of the Spanish naval forces in Cuban waters, and 46 men, comes the news of the wreck and probable total loss of the Spanish warship Cristobal Colon, a secondclass cruiser of about 200 tons displacement and 1,600 horse power. The Cristobol Colon formed part of the fleet of Spanish warships detailed to watch the coast of Cuba in order to prevent the landing of filibustering ex-peditions from the United States and elsewhere. CREW MISSING. Munising, Mich., Oct. 2.-The barge Elma, which broke loose from her tow during the recent storm on Lake Superior has been picked up and taken to Grand Island. She will prove a total loss. About 200,000 feet of her cargo of 520,000 feet of lumber remained on the broken barge. The crew of six men and a woman and child have not been found.

Shortis Happy on His Way to Admit His Crime.

His Counsel Pleads Guilty and Urges

Insanity. Beauharnois, Oct. 2.—The trial of Bertie Shortis for the murder of John Loy and Maxime Leboeuf at Valleyfield on March 2 last, opened here today before Judge Belanger. Donald

Macmaster, Q.C., is crown prosecutor, and J. N. Greenshields, Q.C., and Geo. G. Foster are for the defense. Shortis reached here from Montreal jail at about 8 o'clock and was put in the county jail pending the trial. At 10 o'clock the court opened, and after the judge's charge the grand jury retired to consider the case. The defense will make no attempt to deny that Shortis committed the murder,

but will plead insanity.
Shortis' mother and father are here from Ireland and thousands of people from surrounding districts have congregated to witness the proceedings. Shortis was in high spirits on the journey from Montreal and does not seem in the least to realize his position. When the prisoner alighted from the train the immense crowd closed in on the guard, but they were quickly

sent back to the rear of the platform by the extra police. The prisoner and his special guards and the reporters were quickly rushed into a covered carriage and driven rapidly away to the jail, where a little difficulty arose to get the prisoner through the large crowd.
