Funny Experience of English People "in High Life."

The Imitation Ferris Wheel Stuck-Pas sengers Imprisoned and Hungry.

London, May 22 .- As a curious coincidence, while the members of the House of Commons were practicaly confined in that so-called most comfortable of all clubs, a number of people, men, women and children, were undergoing somewhat similar experihad entered the great wheel there, known as the "gigantic wheel and recreation tower." This structure is an imitation of the famous Ferris wheel of the Chicago World's Fair, but it is larger, the highest point of the London wheel being 300 feet from the ground, while the top of the Ferris wheel was only 264 feet high.
