That, by direction of the Municipal Council, I, Frederick George Rumball, Mayor, do hereby request all people desirous of witnessing the Royal Procession to observe as far as possible the following uggestions: (a) Avoid assembling in great numbers at corners of the streets, as the crossings will be required by the military authori-

(b) As the roadway will be occupied almost entirely by the Royal carriages and their military escort, the people are re-quested to occupy the sidewalks and ad-joining spaces as evenly as possible along the streets traversed. along the streets traversed.

(c) It is most desirable, owing to the very short line of march, that there should be no attempt to either precede or follow the Royal procession, and all citizens and other concerned are requested to be satisfied with one view of same, and avoid rushing to any other place along the route as it is greatly forced that

the route, as it is greatly feared that such action would lead to injury, and possibly fatal accidents.

(d) From the hour of 11 o'clock till after the departure of the Royal Party, the streets selected for route of procession will be placed in charge of the military and police authorities, and all traffic thereon will be stopped, and all persons in charge of street cars, carriages, bicycles or vehicles of whatever kind are requested not to drive on or across any of the said streets; and otherwise, 2s far as possible, aid in keeping same open for the uninterrupted enjoyment of our Royal

It is requested that all citizens, especially those along the streets traversed by the Royal party, will decorate their residences and places of business on the said 12th day of October, and render such

residences and places of business on the said 12th day of October, and render such other assistance as may be in their power to the Council and committee of citizens which have the reception in charge.

(f) Citizens and others interested are requested to observe that the boulevards and sidewalks on Dufferin avenue, Water-loo street and Princess avenue, immediately adjoining the Collegiate Institute, are reserved exclusively for use of the school children of the city, and that all others will be prohibited from occupying any portion thereof.

(g) Manufacturers and others employing labor are requested to close their works, shops, offices or places of business at the hour of 10:30 a.m., and keep same closed until after the departure of the Royal Party; and I hereby proclaim Saturday, the 12th instant, between the hours above mentioned, a public holiday. Mr. Stead gave a glowing account of the pro-gress made by Manchuria under the

Russians. The country is absolutely peaceful, the Chinese are contented and better paid than under the old regime, and the 1,000 miles of railroad connecting the Gulf of Pe Chi Li with the Siberian line is completed, with the exception of a section 70 miles long. A train

runs daily. Besides the army of occupation, 3,000 men, there is a volunteer force of 24,-000 men under 400 officers who are not permitted to go more than two and a half miles from the railroad, which is patrolled from end to end by Cos-
