TO BLOW UP WAR VESSELS. Paris. July 16.-Attempts to blow up arsenals and powder magazines have been made daily for the last fortnight throughout France, principally at Brest, Toulon, Nimes and Lyons. Brest the sentinels were attacked five nights in succession. The police inspector put in charge of the case says he believes the anti-war section of Anarchists, founded a year ago, now has branches in other countries, the members being pledged to destroy all kinds of armament by every possible means. He said that there were three attempts last week to blow up English warships, but they were carefully kept from the public. The Genoa coast batteries and several big guns have been ruined with acids.

A Serious Problem in London's

Oppression-Poor Ventilation.

London, July 16 .- A serious question has arisen in connection with the un-derground tube railway, with which London within a few years is to be pierced in all directions. It has been argued from the start of the "tupenny tube" that the ventilation was auto matic and well-nigh perfect by reason of each train nearly filling the tube and acting like a piston, forcing out the bad air and drawing in the fresh air. The public accepted this theory; as there was no bad odors, it was assumed that the atmosphere was health-

The patronage has become so great have been badly crowded and many passengers began to complain of feelings of dizziness and oppression. It was found that this was due to the presence of a great excess of odorless carbonic acid gas generated by human lungs. A healthy atmosphere should not contain a larger proportion than seven parts in 10,000 of this gas. Ordinary London air contains four parts, a London fog seven parts, and the average living room seven. The standard of purity required in English workshops by the factory act is not to ex-

ceed nine. Three tests were recently made of the air in the tube. The first sample, taken from the top of a crowded car, showed 271/2 parts of carbonic acid gas. This is distinctly poisonous. A second sample, taken from a moderately filled car, showed 13 parts. A test made of the air in Chancery Lane station as a train was leaving, when the purest air should be obtained, showed 13 8-10 parts.

It is believed that this serious situation can be much improved by closing all the openings between the two tubes. There is always a lively breeze blowing in the present tubes, but the foregoing tests show that the air simply moves in what may be described as a vicious circle.

Picked Up \$18,000 Check!

Montreal, Que., July 16.-An accepted check on the Merchants' Bank of Canada for \$18,000, the property of Riddell & Common, commission merchants, was picked up by a boy on the street and restored to the owners. The firm's office boy lost the check out of the bank book while on his way to the bank. A similar case occurred not long ago, but the finder was not so honest, and went to Toronto, where he opened an account in one of the banks and succeeded in realizing on the full amount of the check.


