VENEZUELAN ENTANGLEMENT
BECOMES MORE EMBARRASSING

German Minister's Comment
on British Public Opinion.

UNPOPULARITY OF ALLIANCE

Disinclination to Refer the Matters of
Difference to The Hague—Activity
of the Rebels.

Berlin, Feb. 3.—The German ambas-
sador at London, Count Wolff-Mat-
ternich, in a dispatch to his Govern-
ment, referring to British public
opinion on the Venezuelan question
and the British Cabinet's attitude in
consequence thereof, says the Govern-
ment is conscious of lack of popular
support in its association with Ger-
many, especially of the disapproval of
the middle classes. Premier Balfour
and Foreign Minister Lansdowne have
the support of other members of the
Cabinet in their steadfast determina-
tion to carry out the agreement with
Germany; but the ambassador ven-
tures the opinion that Lord Lans-
downe's position is weakened through
lack of public support, and that the
Cabinet is in a mood to accept almost
any way out of the Venezuelan en-
tanglement that promises the ulti-
mate payment of the claims.

Ambassador Wolff-Matternich also
says a very genuine dislike exists gen-
erally in Great Britain to the Govern-
ment's partnership with Germany, and
in counseling that the negotiations at
Washington be hastened he intimates
that if the situation becomes more con-
fused it is conceivable that Colonial
Secretary Chamberlain on his return
from South Africa may become the in-
terpreter of the popular view in the
cabinet and advise the other ministers
accordingly.

Paris, Feb. 3.—Advisers received here
from Ambassador Jusserand summa-
rizing the status of the Venezuelan ne-
gotiations at Washington, told the of-
ficials to express more confident ex-
pectations of an adjustment of the dis-
ticulties than at any time previous. The
tendency here appears to be toward al-
lowing the allies a month or other brief
period for priority collection of the cus-
tomers.

It is further said here that the ne-
gotiations have developed a general dis-
inclination to consider a reference to
The Hague court of arbitration as a
means of terminating the differences.

ACTIVITY OF THE REBELS.
New York, Feb. 3.—President Cas-
tro's troops, according to a dispatch
to the Herald from Willemstad, Island
of Curacao, are engaged in a battle with
a strong revolutionary force fourteen
miles south of Curacao. There has
been no decisive result, but the rebels
