SIFTON WILL BE TRIED

BY SPECIAL COMMISSION

Advertiser's Prediction Fulfilled

to the Letter.

Sheriff Cameron Receives Precept to Summon Jury.

Mr. Justice Britton the Presiding Judge and Monday, November 3, the Date.

As predicted in The Advertiser of Saturday last, Gerald Sifton is at last to be given the trial which had been so long denied him. On Monday, Nov. 3, he will be brought into court for the fifth time, but on this occasion it will

be with the gratifying knowledge that his trial is to proceed and his guilt or innocence be put to the proof, and not, as on three of the four previous occasions, with the disheartening possibility of an adjournment of the case, with its attendant misery of an additional half year in the gloomy cells which have been his only habitation now for over 26 months.

The Advertiser on Saturday announced on good authority that the case would be taken up on Monday, Nov. 3, by Mr. Justice Britton, who would be appointed a special commission to try the case. Sheriff Cameron has now received the precept enjoining him to proceed with the summoning of the panel of jurors from whose numbers will be selected twelve good men and true who will say whether Gerald Sifton did or did not kill his father, Joseph Hamersley Sifton, on the morning of Saturday, June 30, 1900.

NEW PLAN IS FAVORED

INCREASE WAS \$25,667

Municipal Wood Yard May Be Established Here.

Wood Can Be Bought for \$5, But Local Dealers Ask \$12.

The Montreal plan of establishing municipal woodyards may be adopted in this city also, if the city council favors the idea. It was talked of at the meeting of the board of works last night and the aldermen seemed to think that something was amiss when it is possible to get wood on the curb at outside points for \$5 a cord and yet as much as \$12 50 per cord is asked for it by a local dealer.

A somewhat similar state of affairs exists at Montreal and Mayor Parent brought forward the municipal yard suggestion. If adopted here an agent may be appointed to go in search of wood, which shall then be sold to the poor at a reasonable figure. The railroad might be asked to give the city a special rate.

Members of Board of Works Displeased.

Not Satisfied With Ald. Cooper's Methods of Work.

The breach between Ald. Cooper and the city engineer is becoming wider and wider, and like all feuds which have any claim to a proper standing in the community, is beginning to include others besides the original two in the cast of disputants. The mayor found his side last night at the meeting of the board of works, and, strange as it may seem, he was not found fighting on the side of the intellectual chairman of No. 2. The reason of this was that it was quite manifest that Ald. Cooper had issued orders at variance with those of the city engineer, and the result was not to the best interests of the city. Evidence of his work may be seen at Victoria Park, where boulders have been placed on the paths for gravel, and at Lytle street, in the east end, which, Ald. Dreaney alleges, is in a most insanitary condition. In the face of practically unanimous criticism of his actions, Ald. Cooper felt back to his own special mode of defense and talked so persistently vigorously and volubly, that the mayor was attacked by a violent nose-bleed, and the meeting was delayed while solicitous recommendations were made by the aldermen regarding the use of keys and such cold things as sure cures. Now that Ald. Cooper has observed what may be the result of his speeches, it is probable that he will continue making them.

Between the attacks upon Ald. Cooper, the board managed to get a little work done. The city engineer was notified to instruct the street railway company that the committee is not satisfied with the way the repairing is being done on their track allowance, and that unless it is properly done, the city shall do it and charge it to the company. Sewers for Cartwright street (between Dufferin avenue and Princess avenue), and on Ontario street (between Dundas and Queen's avenue), will be advertised.
