

BOURASSA, TARTE HAVE A TILT

Meet on Platform at Laprairie
and Exchange Some Pleas-
anties.

Montreal, Sept. 20.—The Liberal demonstration which was held at Laprairie, Saturday afternoon, was so notable an event. Mr. Tarte appeared at the meeting. Mr. Bourassa, M. P., and Mr. Monet, M. P., were also there, and there was a lively exchange of opinions. Over five thousand people gathered to hear the orators, and while there were some interruptions, Mr. Tarte was given a good hearing. Mr. Tarte dealt with the fiscal policy of Canada, advocated an adjustment of the tariff schedules, and explained the relative interests of the various countries, the United States, Great Britain and the rest of the world in respect thereto. He advocated the lake-and-rail policy, which he has strenuously contended for in council and in Parliament. The wind-up of his speech was devoted to more personal matters. He touched upon the method of acquiring La Patrie, and also recounted his story of the manner in which he left the Cabinet. Mr. Monet, M. P. for Laprairie and Naperville, told the audience that although Mr. Tarte was there on his invitation he did not intend to mince matters in dealing with the honorable gentleman's public record. He approached the ex-minister with having deserted Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and accused Mr. Tarte of having made off with La Patrie, to the great detriment of the Liberal party. Mr. Monet closed with a peroration, calling upon the electors and hearers to adhere to the tenets of Liberalism and to elect their faces sternly against Mr. Tarte's new ally, Mr. Chamberlain, in his effort to rob the people of the Province of Quebec of their hard-earned and well-deserved autonomy. Mr. Bourassa denounced Messrs. Tarte, Chamberlain and the Imperial idea. The Chamberlain idea, he said, was destructive of Canadian autonomy. It was conducive to the abrogation of rights which the people of the Province of Quebec held sacred. Protection to a greater extent than now obtains means the creation of trusts. He quoted Mr. Tarte's utterances in La Patrie and on the hustings. Ten minutes speeches by Messrs. Tarte and Monet brought the meeting to a close. The former referred to Mr. Bourassa's youth, his hot-headed utterances, and assured his hearers that age would bring him wisdom. Previous to the meeting there were rumors of ructions and riots when the proceedings began. On the contrary the meeting was most orderly.

ROYALTY ON A HOLIDAY

Queen Alexandria Making a Visit
to Copenhagen.

London, Sept. 19.—The King left Buckingham Palace yesterday afternoon, says the Pall Mall Gazette, for a visit to Lord and Lady Savile. The King will today, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday travel from Orlerton to Balmoral. The Queen accompanied by Princess Victoria and attended by Miss Charlotte Knollys and Colonel Brocklehurst, left London yesterday afternoon en route to Copenhagen. The King saw her majesty off at Charing Cross station, where a large crowd had assembled. Their majesties drove privately from Buckingham Palace to the station in a palace carriage and without military escort, being preceded merely by a mounted sergeant of police. The King and Queen and Princess entered the principal saloon, in the privacy of which they exchanged farewells. As soon as the King had stepped out of the saloon the starting signal was given and the special train left for Port Victoria. Her majesty embarked on the royal yacht at Port Victoria at half past 1 o'clock, and the Victoria and Albert sailed for Copenhagen.

DROWNED FLEEING FROM THE FLAMES

Three Lives Lost by Burning
of a Steamer Near St.
John, N. B.

St. John, N. B., Sept. 21.—While making her way up the St. John River Saturday with 40 passengers and a heavy cargo of freight, the Star Line Steamship Company's steamer David Weston caught fire, probably from a match dropped into a bale of hay, and before she could run ashore was practically consumed. Three persons, a waitress, a deck hand and an 11-year-old boy, the latter one of the passengers, were drowned by jumping overboard. The boy was from the flames. Seven or eight other persons were injured but not seriously. As soon as the vessel caught fire a boat was launched and made several trips to the shore crowded with passengers. Many persons, however, jumped into the river. All but three were dragged out. The drowned: Elita Morrell, 21, of St. John, waitress; Fred Downey, aged 21, of St. John, deck hand; Steven Hood Howan, aged 11, Manchester, England, passenger. The David Weston was on her regular trip from Fredericton to this city. It is supposed a careless smoker was the cause of the fire.

TWO VESSELS ASHORE

A Coal Ship and Schooner Lost at
Cape Race.

St. Johns, Nfld., Sept. 21.—The British steamer Tofide, from Cardiff, for Bonne Bay, Nfld., with a cargo of coal for British warships, went ashore Saturday morning off Cape Race in a dense fog, and will become a total loss. The crew was saved. The Tofide is the steamer whose crew was arrested by the Venezuelans last December at Cape Cabello, for which insult to the British flag the British warship and the German flag ship Vineta bombed Puerto Cabello. The crew was saved by the Venezuelans, bound from the Newfoundland fishing banks for European waters with a cargo of fish, also went ashore at Cape Race as a result of the fog. She too, will become a total loss. The crews of both vessels were saved.

F., Saturday shot and killed two gamblers of Cherokee blood named Buck Martin and James Spotts, who were advancing upon a son of the mayor with the expressed intention of cutting his throat. Mayor Russell interfered and the men threatened to cut his throat. Young Russell was city marshal last year. He raided a gambling house conducted by Spotts and Martin, which is supposed to be the cause of the attempt upon his life.

SULTAN BACKED BY THE KAISER

Germany Declares That the
Sovereignty of Turkey
Must Be Upheld.

Vienna, Sept. 19.—There is good authority for the statement that Emperor William and Chancellor Von Buelow in conversation with diplomats here expressed strongly the view that the sovereignty of the Sultan of Turkey should be maintained to the fullest extent. Paris, Sept. 19.—At a meeting of the Cabinet today, M. Delcasse, the foreign minister, informed his colleagues that Austria and Russia would intervene in the near east only in order to hasten reforms, and that France would support those governments in that policy.

The second class cruiser Du Challa has left Toulon for Turkish waters. Washington, Sept. 19.—A cablegram was received at the Navy Department today from Rear Admiral Cotton at Beyrout, saying that the situation there continued quiet.

Sofia, Sept. 19.—The revolutionaries are now concentrating all their operations in Eastern Macedonia, the latest dispatches indicating that a general rising was fixed to begin today. The insurgents claim to have accumulated vast stores of provisions, ammunition and dynamite, and to be prepared to enter upon a serious campaign. Fighting is already proceeding at Melnik, which is besieged by 1,500 insurgents under the leadership of four men formerly officers in the Bulgarian army. Melnik is a very important strategic point in the mountains. The Turkish garrison is believed to consist of only one battalion. The result of the attack is not yet known. Severe fighting is reported to have taken place at Okrida, where a band of revolutionaries, headed by a Bulgarian, surrounded a force of Turks and a fight ensued, lasting an entire day. In the evening the insurgents, reinforced, routed the Turks, the latter losing 300 killed.

At Dobruvan, in the district of Lere, a fight has taken place between Turks and insurgents in which the former lost 70 killed and many wounded. The insurgents lost only four killed, but many of them were wounded.

Two hundred Turkish officers left Constantinople yesterday on their way to Salonica and Adrianople.

DOG BURIED IN STATE
Rich New Yorker Spends \$200 on
Funeral of Pet.

New York, Sept. 19.—Two hundred dollars for a dog's funeral—this seems a big sum, but it is, nevertheless, a fact. The dog's name was "Dane," and was owned by William C. Larsen, of West One Hundred and Fourteenth street. He now rests in the dog cemetery, near White Plains, after lying in state in his master's house for five days.

Dane was an Irish setter and had been the pet of the Larsen household for seven and a half years. An embalmer was called in as soon as the pet died and took full charge. As soon as he was put in his dainty casket hundreds of his admirers of the neighborhood came to the funeral. The dog was called, and on the day of the funeral it was necessary to send a detail of policemen to clear the way in front of the house for the funeral. The body was taken in a train to White Plains and a floral piece with the dog's name in colors was left on the head of the grave. The casket alone cost \$75 and the entire cost of the funeral footed up to \$200. On the coffin was a silver plate with the inscription "Dane." Dane's collar, chain and muzzle were buried.

CHOLERA IN THE ARMY
Ten Members of Shropshire Regiment Have Died.

London, Sept. 19.—Information has been received at Shrewsbury that the Second Battalion of the King's Shropshire Light Infantry, which greatly distinguished itself at Paardeberg and in other engagements in the Boer war, had been attacked by cholera at Rankhet, Bengal, and the Lieut. Carter and ten men had died from the disease. The mortality from cholera among the British troops in India, which in 1899 was the lowest on record (only one fatal case being recorded), rose in 1900-1901 to 58 out of 107 cases. Nearly a fourth of the deaths occurred among the troops stationed at Secunderabad, where the disease attacked all the corps in the barracks except the artillery.

During the same period the deaths from cholera in the native army amounted to 29, equal to 2.36 per 1,000 of strength, as compared with 9 (0.53) in 1899. In 1900 the total deaths from cholera in India were 757,222, or 3.70 per 1,000.

Rogers, one of Mr. Green's attorneys. He was at once taken before Commissioner Hall and was held for a primary examination next Friday. Police Commissioner Jonas M. Kilmer, a millionaire, became his bondsman for \$10,000. Senator Green pleaded not guilty to both indictments with the privilege of withdrawing the plea and interposing any such objection as he shall desire after a careful review of the indictments. Theodore R. Tuthill, of this city, has also been retained by Mr. Green.
