The British Budget.

The budget statement of the British Chancellor of the Exchequer shows that the cloud of depression is lifting from the British Isles. The heavy dea surplus of \$15,000,000, and the national debt has been reduced by \$37 .-790,000 during the fiscal year. The expenditure for the ensuing year is estimated at \$705,140,000, and the revenue on the existing basis of taxation, \$720,020,000, leaving a surplus of \$14,860,000. The extra duty of four cents per pound placed on tea last year will be removed, which will absorb half the estimated surplus, and certain small customs warehousing charges and stamp duties will be abolished, leaving a small balance to meet contin-The income taxpayers will gencies. get no relief. religion, goes to the extent of mak-

The expenditure of the United Kingdom has increased enormously in the past ten years. In 1894-5 the revenue was \$412,755,955, and the expenditure \$408,929,250. This increase in the burden of the taxpayers, amounting to nearly 60 per cent in ten years, is in a great measure due to the growing outlay on the army and navy, these two services calling for \$316,000,000 in the current year, as compared with \$177,-889,600 in 1894-5. The per capita taxation of the British people is more than double that of Canadians, an advantage which we owe to our comparative immunity from the incubus of militarism. The fact that Great Britain responds so readily to progressive taxation shows that the national wealth is increasing, notwithstanding the appalling poverty in the great centers of population, but there must be a limit to the financial endurance of the country, and many think the limit has been almost reached. The destruction of a large portion of the Russian fleet has enabled the British Government to reduce its naval estimates this year, but if Germany, France and the United States, and eventually Russia, continue their ambitious naval programmes, Great Britain must in time renounce the policy of maintaining her fleet on the basis of superiority over any other two fleets combined. Perhaps a working alliance with Japan will ease the strain of this competi-

The healthier state of the finances may be a mixed satisfaction to Mr. Austen Camberlain, as it deprives his illustrious father of some of his political thunder. The former colonial secretary has been preaching blue ruin, and found consolation a year ago in the record of declining exports and revenue. The exports for the year just closed were the largest in the history of the country, and now the budget removes another of his props. There is every evidence that the Chamberlain movement has become stalemated and that Mr. Chamberlain realizes that heroic measures are necessary to reanimate the Unionist party, which he has almost wrecked. He has called a meeting of his parliamentary supporters to devise ways and means of uniting the party, perhaps by the sacrifice or the temporary withdrawal of some features of his preferential pelicy.
