An attempted criminal assault upon little girl in the heart of the busiless district of London almost resulted in the murder of the victim last

The assault took place on the north side of King street, midway between Richmond and Clarence, and all thoroughfares at the time were being traversed by large numbers of pedestrians, Richmond and Clarence streets being particularly well lighted. The victim is the 11-year-old daugh-

ter of a prominent citizen. The little girl is now confined to her home, with the marks of the peroundrel's fingers around her throat, nd with several ugly bruises on her head and shoulders.

Last evening, the little girl, with her mother and aunt, were visiting on Colborne street, and about 8:30 they started for home, walking west on the north side of King street. The aunt was detained through some reason, and the mother told the child to wait

for the aunt. The little girl walked slowly, gradually allowing her mother to leave her, until Clarence street was reached, when the child thought she would take a look back to see if the aunt was coming. She stayed around the corner for five or ten minutes, walking a short distance back toward Wellington street. 
