HUSBAND'S DEATH CLOSE ON THAT OF WIFE

Mr. Franklin Mutch, a Well-Known Former Londoner, Died Yesterday.

Death did not long divide Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Mutch. It is just a week ago Sunday that Mrs. Mutch died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. C. E. Wheeler, of Waterloo street; and yesterday again the house was darkened by the shadow of death, when Mr. Franklin Mutch died, just eight days after his wife. Mr. Mutch was a native of Pergus, having been born in that place 66 years ago. It is over 25 years ago since he came to London, where he was employed in the Grand Trunk car shops. While in London he was a manager in the King Street Presbyterian church, and took a very prominent part in all its activities. Eleven years ago he moved to Woodstock and joined the James Hay Company. Some weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Mutch came to London on a visit to their daughter, and shortly after their arrival both were taken ill, and died in their daughter's home. The survivors of the family are: James, of Detroit; Mrs. C. E. Wheeler, of this city; Mrs. Sydney D. Dalmage, of Toronto, and the Misses Elsie and Georgina, at home.

MAY ANNEX SUBURBS TO SECURE POPULATION

Latest Scheme Being Put Forth by the Advocates of Sunday Cars in London.

It is expected that ward 1 will show an increase in population, perhaps 100, but not nearly sufficient to place the population of the city at 50,000. At the present time the assessors are busily engaged on the work, and will finish it within a reasonable length of time. There is some talk of taking annexation proceedings to bring in the suburbs in order to have a Sunday car service.

If cars were favorably received under the present agreement, Pottersburg, Broughdale and Springbank would be part of the city. Green would not be served satisfactorily. If these portions of the city were annexed, there would undoubtedly be more than 50,000 people, sufficient to give Sunday car service.

Such a move has been taken as yet, but it is anticipated that something of that nature will be attempted within a short time.

A COMPLETE INSTITUTION

Modern in Every Respect, and Well Calculated to Serve the Purpose for Which It is Intended.

The new isolation section of Victoria Hospital was opened for visitors yesterday afternoon, and quite a number of the citizens of London took advantage of the opportunity to view what is undoubtedly one of the most complete buildings of its kind in Canada. It would be hard to imagine a brighter or more cheerful looking structure than this. Windows are everywhere, and these, in conjunction with the spotless white walls, leave not a single dark spot in the whole building. Instead of the usual corners, where floor and walls meet, the surfaces have been curved out, so that there isn't a place where even the most retiring microbe could elude observation. A particle of dust find a safe resting place.

The west ward is given over to scarlet fever patients, while the east is for diphtheria cases. The two wards are exactly similar, and are joined by a long corridor that successfully isolates the two buildings from one another.

A Complete Hospital.
