ONTARIO'S REVENUES

Matheson Estimates That There Will Be No Surplus.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—Ontario's revenue for this short fiscal year will be within \$10,000 of the expenditure, Col. Matheson, the provincial treasurer, estimates. This is leaving out the capital expenditure on Niagara power, the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, and on good roads.

Taking the receipts for November and December, the chief revenue months of the year, which now go into the next fiscal year, a surplus of several thousand dollars could be shown for the calendar year. In these months the second half of the crown license fees are paid, and also the crown timber dues.

The increase of receipts for the ten months of the new fiscal year ending Oct. 31, over the estimates are, approximately: Crown lands, \$500,000; law stamps, \$50,000; public institutions, \$20,000; Central Prison industries, \$7,000; Provincial Secretary's department, charters, etc., \$82,000; agricultural department and stationary engineers, \$28,000; success fees, \$25,000; supplementary revenue, \$25,000; liquor license branch, \$50,000; Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, \$250,000; and games and fisheries, \$17,000.

Added to this is arrears of Algoma taxes totalling \$8,500.

These increases total about \$1,250,000 above the estimates.

MURDER AT BUFFALO

Crazy Man Shoots Another in the Public Library.

Buffalo, Nov. 26.—Without explanation or warning but with a deliberation that made the accomplishment of his murderous purpose simple, Charles Strohl, an employee of a bakery, walked into the reading-room of the Buffalo public library today, pulled a revolver and shot and instantly killed Franz Stantz, who boarded with Mrs. E. Decola, on Broadway.

The murderer rushed out of the building, pursued by a number of people, and turning into an alley, exchanged shots with his pursuers, one shot striking an officer in the hand, disabling him. By this time fifteen hundred people had gathered. Strohl, taking shelter behind a brick wall, occasionally looked over and fired. For 15 minutes he held the crowd at bay. Finally, after the police had fired 40 or 50 shots, they executed a flank movement and he was finally cornered and caught.

"I had blown you all to — if you hadn't got back of me," he snarled. The police revolvers covered him. When finally taken he was found to have two revolvers and over half a box of cartridges. He had reloaded and fired his revolvers several times.

While Strohl appeared quite rational after his capture by the police he became highly excited later and talked incoherently of Stantz and two or three other men. He said Stantz had taken his life blood, and there were others he wanted to murder in a dual. His mental condition will be looked into this afternoon.

BRITAIN AND NICARAGUA.

London, Nov. 26.—The publication here of the dispatch from Bluefields, Nicaragua, which found its way into America by way of Colon and was cabled to London, to the effect that Commander Theaker, of the British cruiser Seylla, had paid an official visit to Provisional President Estrada, excited some comment here today.

The story lacks official confirmation here.

As a matter of fact, the recognition of the Nicaraguan insurgents has never been considered by this Government.

"SPOTTERS" NOT THERE

Hanna's Men Failed to Turn Up and Convictions Were Quashed.

Windsor, Nov. 26.—An echo of the recent wholesale prosecution of Windsor, Walkerville and Essex County liquor dealers was heard in Judge McHugh's chamber this morning, when Jacob Mailloux, of the Colonial Hotel, won an appeal against conviction and a fine of \$200 by Magistrate Breaux, of Sandwich.

The Government spotters, who were instrumental in procuring evidence against the hotelmen, failed to put in an appearance today as scheduled, and Judge McHugh, after hearing evidence from the defence, quashed the conviction, with no costs.

The spotters also failed to appear in the Sandwich police court during the afternoon to give evidence against Isaac Norton, of the Lagoon Park Hotel, Magistrate Breaux dismissed the charge against him. Norton was charged with selling liquor on Sunday.

THE INJUNCTION WILL NOT STOP POWER LINE

The H. E. P. Commission Will Continue the Work to Supply Port Arthur With Energy.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—The hydro-electric power commission is not going to pay any attention to the Port Arthur injunction, so far as the actual work of construction, transmission line, power stations, etc., is concerned. It will, of course, be obeyed so far as entering into any agreement with the city is concerned. The work of constructing the power line from Kakabeka Falls to the city and of building the transformer station will be proceeded with at once.

This was learned from official circles this morning, and is contingent on the re-submitting of the hydro-electric bylaw in the northern town. Hon. Adam Beck wired to Port Arthur to this effect last night before leaving for Montreal.

Port Arthur has twice adopted a by-law in favor of the hydro, and twice it has been stopped by technicalities.

The contract with Mr. Jas. Conner's corporation, the Ontario and Michigan Power Company, expires in March next, and unless an agreement can be reached with the hydro-electric power line before that time the city will be compelled to sign an interim contract with the Conner company.

The injunction does not, of course, bind the hydro commission in the matter of construction.

TAKEN IN BY HAWLEY.

New York, Nov. 26.—In responsible banking circles it was estimated today that negotiations for the sale of the St. Louis and San Francisco Railroad to Benjamin F. Yoakum, chairman of the executive committee of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway Company, are in process of consummation. It is believed Mr. Yoakum will hand the St. Louis and San Francisco over to Edwin Hawley.

MONTREAL BLACK-HANDERS.

Montreal, Nov. 26.—Antonio Fraruto, of Amherst street, reporter to the police that shortly after the sentencing of two Black-Handers recently he received a demand for \$250 under threat of death for himself and wife, and a few days ago the demand was renewed, this time for \$500. Fraruto had only \$50, and this he deposited as directed, and the money was taken.

EARLY TRIAL FOR FRITCH.

Detroit, Nov. 26.—Prosecutor Van Zile decided this afternoon that he would have the Dr. Fritch murder case tried before the Taube case, now before the recorder's court. This will probably be next week.

The prosecutor himself will handle the case, which is involved in the finding of the dismembered parts of Mabelle Millman's body in Ecorse Creek. He is calculating that the trial will begin on Tuesday or Wednesday.

MURDERERS ESCAPE.

Gambao, Oaxo, Mexico, Nov. 26.—It was discovered today that 28 prisoners in the penitentiary at Tehuantepec, many of them murderers, had escaped yesterday by digging beneath the prison walls. The structure was erected in 1540 and the tunneling of the prisoners caused the walls to fall.

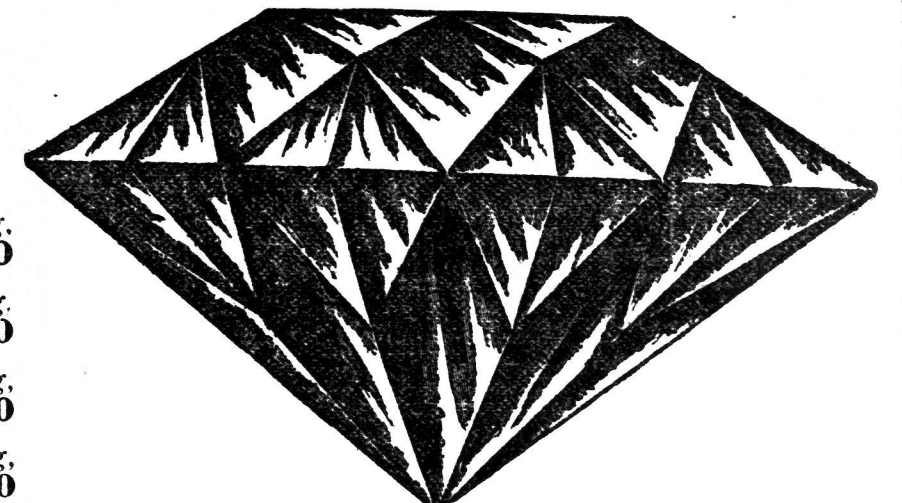
