UNDERWRITERS' WARN AGAINST HOLIDAY PERIL

Point Out Danger of Inflammable Material in Decorations.

Fire Chief Atken has received the following circular from the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association:

Dear Sir:—Following our usual custom at this season of the year, I beg to call your attention to the dangers to life and property from Christmas decorations, displays, etc., which are frequently made at this time of the year. The use of Christmas greens, harvest specimens and other inflammable materials such as draperies, streamers, etc., to represent snow, and the like (especially in connection with electric and other lighting systems), is decidedly not a safe practice, and it is impossible to make displays of that nature perfectly safe.
The third statutory condition of your insurance policy reads in part as follows: Any change material to the risk, but within the control or knowledge of the assured, shall avoid the policy, as to the part affected thereby, unless the change is promptly notified to the company or its local agent.
In addition to the danger to property from the display referred to, the danger to life in crowded stores or places of meeting, by reason of a panic occasioned by fire, is so great that the underwriters, who have made a study of the hazards, would find it their duty should they not give this warning.

NORTH MIDLAND CO. HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

Company Seeking London's Aid in Perfect Legal Condition, an Official Explains.

A prominent official of the North Midland Railway Company, which is seeking to have its bonds guaranteed by a number of municipalities including the city of London, today stated that the city solicitor, who was the city solicitor, to the effect that the company was not incorporated.
The North Midland Railway was permanently incorporated in March, 1908, the original incorporation being provisional," he said, "but the necessary requirements of the law were complied with and the company fully organized at that time. The company is in a perfectly legal and proper condition to commence work at any time."
The city's money, if any is used, would neither be asked for nor furnished until after it had been properly certified to by the financier's engineers.
