FOR HENRY WINTERSJohnston Brothers' Horse Takes
2:18 Trot in Four Heats at
Syracuse Meet.

Syracuse, Sept. 12.—The \$5,000 Syracuse stake which is the racing feature of the Grand Circuit meeting, held in connection with the New York State fair which commenced here today, was won by the black stallion, The Abbe, making the eighth straight victory for the Johnston brothers.

At no time in any of the three heats was the winner in trouble, and the main interest in the race was the fight for second place, which went to the bay mare, Lady Isle, driven by "Long-shot" Cox, the New England teamster.

The Abbe has lost but a single heat this year, the first in the Chamber of Commerce at Detroit, Evelyn W., the Cleveland mare, which won third money today, being the only one to head the race.

The horse World stake for 3-year-olds is on the card for tomorrow spoiled the stake for colts of that age today, and only three started.

Crab, the one generally considered the best of the field, but who was beaten by Lionella, is a full sister to Caravina, 2:07 1/4, the fastest of the 1909 3-year-olds. Today she was on her bad behavior, made breaks and was beaten by the good-mannered Dickerson colt, although she showed far more speed than either of the others.

JOHNSTON BROS., HENRY WINTERS TAKES 2:10 1-4 MARK.

Henry Winters, owned by Johnston Bros., of London, Ont., the winner of the 2:18 trot, was Len McDonald's early season reliance of the M. and M. at Detroit. He did not live up to his reputation in his early work, and was not a starter in the Detroit classic, proving a great disappointment to his trainer. He seems now to be rounding into form and took record of 2:10 1/4 in the third heat today.

Tomorrow the \$10,000 Empire State stake for 2:14 trotters will divide honors with the Horse World stake for 3-year-old trotters. Hailworth is the popular choice for the Empire, but he is reported to be a little off, and will have to beat such cracks as John, Doodle Archdale and Major Strong, Colorado A. looks to have a chance in the colt stake.
