### HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE WRESTED FROM **BLACK MAN AFTER 26 ROUNDS** OF DESPERATE, HEAVY FIGHTING

THE "KNOCKOUT" ROUND.

ROUND TWENTY-SIX .- Willard opened with a smash to Johnson's body. The referee forced them to break from a clinch. Willard rushed and slammed Johnson with right and left to the body. In a clinch the latter looked over Willard's shoulders to his wife's box and Willard smashed Johnson.

Willard won on a knockout. The great crowd rushed into the ring and menaced Johnson. Several squads of soldiers hurried on to the platform and cleared the crowd away to protect the fighters.

Ringside, Havana, April 5.—Jess Willard, the cowboy, i the new heavyweight champion pugilist of the world. He knocked out Jack Johnson, the black champion, in the twentysixth round of their championship bout here today. It was Johnson's fight all the way until the twenty-second round, when his vitality left him because of the hard pace. The knockout was a terrific right swing to the jaw.

The giant plainsman opened his heaviest attack, and in the next few rounds carried the fight away from the black man and toppled him with rights and lefts to the body and blows to the

Up to the twenty-sixth, Willard had beaten the negro champien in eleven rounds. Johnson had the best of only three. Eleven rounds were even.

Seventeen thousand people saw the combat, and when Johnson crumpled pon the floor from a flerce right swing to the jaw, the crowd burst into the ring. Soldiers cleared the ring. Johnson took the referee's count while lying on the ropes ,but the moment

after Referee Welsh had given the decision the former champion got to his feet in time to escape the wild rush of excited spctators.


