Four Champions Will Battle for Honor in New York.

Box Office Sales for Willard-Moran Bout Now Total \$130,000.

NEW YORK, March 21.-Leading up to the Willard-Moran bout here next in Greater New York this week. In the latter days of the Horton law sixteen years ago several big battles were fought in Madison Square Garden dur-ing the last week of August. This romises to be the banner week in New York's ring history, however, as not less than four champions will meet in ten-round bouts at Manhattan and Brooklyn clubs.

Freddie Welsh, the world's lightweight champion, met Phil Bloom in Brooklyn tonight, and in the same ring Al McCoy, who claims the middleweight tle on his knockout of George Chip, took on Leo Benz of Butte, Mont., in another ben-round bout. Welsh has engagement here to box Whitney Friday night at a Harlem club, and at the same place Johany Kilbane, the featherweight champion, is to meet Harry Donohue of Peoria, Ill.

Box Office Sales \$130,000 Nearly all of the best seats in the big garden have been disposed of for Willard-Moran battle, and the box office sales up to tonight showed a total of \$130,000. Only a few \$25 and \$15 seats are left, and all of the \$20 and \$10 reservations have been sold. The cheaper seats at \$5 and \$3 will be put on sale Thursday morning. A conservative estimate places the total gate at \$150,000. Willard took only a short walk this morning, but he boxed six fast rounds


