

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, Jan. 13 .- "The Ottawarescott road will be constructed before the snow flles next fall." When Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of highways, announced this tonight before several hundred representative

citizens in the city council chamber, the audience broke out into cheers and apaudience broke out into cheers and applause.

A later announcement by the minister as to the general road policy of Ontario made it apparent that the road in question would be a macadam one in part, possibly a gravel one in part, and of a "more permanent structure where conditions required such." This, however, was not announced directly as regards the Ottawa-Prescott road, but as part of the policy of the Ontario Government for all trunk lines in the province.

The meeting was warmly favorable to thon. Mr. Biggs, and he received many congratulations on his promise. He also added that it was the policy of the Government to build more permanent roads as soon as the traffic or other conditions rendered the upkeep of macadam or gravel roads more costly than the interest upon a new and more durable road.

In future the Government will pay townships 40 per cent of the cost of building township roads. The present rate is 25 per cent. Moreover, while at present the Government pays 25 per cent of the salary of a township road engineer, up to a salary of \$600, in future the Government will pay 40 per cent of such engineer's salary up to any sum the township cares to go. "The higher the salary the better the man," stated Hon. Mr. Biggs.

All county road engineers in Ontario are ordered to report in Toronto about March 1. and when there it will be instilled into them that it is absolutely necessary for them to keep their roads in good repair. Mr. Biggs stated that there were snormous losses in Ontario through roads being built and then practically abandoned, so far as any upkeep work being performed.

Take Over Roads.

The Government would take over as many country roads and turn them into provincial county roads as was decided upon, and this would leave the counties more money to develop other county roads.

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The minister announced that the politics of any man working in his department would not for a minute be considered or inquired into. "I shall treat as one hundred per cent men it ill I and differently, and then they will not last two minutes."
