

Care in Packing Essential To Save Fruit From Inroads of Decay.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 11 .- The best way to keep apples is not to use them. Someone has liberated the forethem. Someone has liberated the foregoing facetious remark as a short, effective method for making the apple
supply last. However, it is not satisfactory; the apples are likely to decay.
It is something of a problem for the
majority of householders to keep winter
apples. The average consumer in the
city pays no more attention to keeping
his apple supply than he does potatoes,
although as a matter of fact, apples
when properly cared for are much better late in the season if attention is ter late in the season if attention i

As everyone knows who has tried it, even sound winter apples if left in a warm room or in a cellar near a fur nace soon lose flavor and decay. The result is that many householders lay in no apple supply, but depend on buying in small lots from the store, paying, of course, the long price. As a rule, too, apples obtained from stores in mid-winter are inferior. Ordinarily apples can be readily obtained in lots of a few can be readily obtained in lots of a few bushels from growers early in the season at a price much under what they are retailed at later on.

Here is the recipe, and while there are many others, this ranks as one of the best and simplest. Get good, sound apples. That is the first necessity. No

ples. That is the first necessity. No apple will keep long that has begun to show signs of decay. Get apples that have not ripened beyond the normal point for the season, for as a matter of fact, as any storage man will explain, once an apple begins to ripen chemical processes are set up that cannot be

readily checked.

How To Care for Fruit,

Handle the apples carefully. Some people handle apples as they would potatoes and then wonder the fruit does not keep; handle apples as you would eggs and be particular that there is no bruising.

o bruising.
Provide barrels in which to put the Provide barrels in which to put the apples, or boxes will do. Now lay a rather thick course of paper, newspapers are excellent, in the bottom of the barrel or box, letting the papers extend up the side. Put in a course of apples, one tier deep, and no deeper. Arrange around carefully. Do, not drop them into the barrel, put them in carefully; an apple bruised is an apple ready to rot.

Put a course of papers over this tier

to rot.

Put a course of papers over this tier of apples precisely as was put over the bottom of the barrel although it need not be so thick. Three or four thicknesses are sufficient. Let the paper extend up the side of the barrel as described in starting the bottom. Put on another tier of apples, repeating paper course and apple tiers until the barrel or box, as the case may be, is within two inches of the top. Then mat down a mass of naners tightly over the top. Lay the barrel head on to hold them firm or any weight that will cover the top. It is a good plan to throw a piece of burlap or barring over the top as the final touch. That completes the process of packing.

The next important thing is temperature. About every house nowadays has a fruit cellar. It makes a good place to store the packed apples. Never put them in the part of the cellar heated by the furnace. The fruit will ripen prematurely, rof and there will be only the trouble for the pains.

It is apparent from the description of the method that the object is first to pack the apples away from the air. The closer they are kept from the air. The closer they are kept from the air. The better and then to keep them cool. If the fruit cellar can be kept down to 24 Fahrenheit through the winter the apples will remain firm, crisp, ret.in their flavor and there will be very little rot. Regulate the temperature by opening or closing the outside window, keeping them from freezing by a narrow margin.
