OLD FAIR "PALACE" MAY BE ALTERED FOR HOCKEY ARENA

Alderman G. A. Wenige Certain the Cost Would Not Exceed \$10,000.

That London can obtain a hockey arena at a cost of \$10,000, according to Ald. George A. Wenige. He declares that the main building at Queen's Park, popularly known as "The Palace," can be converted into an arena at the above estimated cost.

"This building is over 200 feet long and 50 feet wide from post to post," he informed The Advertiser today. "In addition, there is fifteen feet additional space on either side of the posts. What is contained in that building can be converted into an ideal arena."

"The booths in the centre utilized during fair week, could be made collapsible and stored in one of the side buildings at the south of the palace. Seats for spectators could be erected in the space at the sides, and being collapsible could be removed fair week. 'Boxes' could be erected at the sides also."

"\$10,000 Quite Sufficient."—The alterations to the completely surrounding building, is already there. The \$10,000 would completely cover the cost of these alterations and in a few seasons the outlay would be returned. Citizens do not realize the size of this building, which lays idle practically 51 weeks in the year.

"Of course the objection will be registered that the fair grounds will be altered and it is not worth the expense, but the Western Fair Association has decided to stay where it is, and an arena is essential. This idea is worth considering, and I can prove it, as I have interviewed architects who bear me out in my contention."

CORNER-STONE OF HOSPITAL WING IS LAID AT CHATHAM

Big New Addition Will Have Most Modern Equipment.

[Special to The Advertiser.]—Chatham, Sept. 2.—The corner stone of the new memorial wing of the public general hospital was laid this afternoon amid impressive ceremonies. Dr. T. K. Holmes, the veteran surgeon of Kent County, performed the ceremony in the presence of many hundreds, and declared the stone to be well and truly laid.

Addresses were given by Dr. Holmes, Mayor Fred Briscoe, A. B. McCog, M.P. for West Kent, and County Warden John F. Fletcher. All the speakers congratulated the hospital authorities on the excellent progress of the work, and expressed the hope that the building would serve its purpose in the same noble manner as the older portions of the hospital.

The new building is of fireproof construction, and is 136 feet in length and 40 in width. All modern equipment will be installed, and telephones provided for the new and old buildings will be used as a monster sanitarium. The architects are Watt & Blackwell of London.
