ELEVEN NEW MINISTERS IN REORGANIZED CABINET UNDER PREMIER MEIGHEN

R. G. Manion of Fort William Becomes Head of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment.

NEWLY APPOINTED ONES ARE SWORN INTO OFFICE

Caldar, Reid and Foster Are Retired, But Will Likely Go to Senate.

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—Canadian Press.—The prime minister, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, had a couple of surprises when he announced his new cabinet this morning, after the ministers had been sworn in by his excellency the governor-general, who returned to the city at 5:15 o'clock from Kingston. R. B. Bennett, K.C., of Calgary, succeeds Rt. Hon. C. J. Doherty as minister of justice, and R. G. Manion of Fort William becomes minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment. Both of these men had been prominently mentioned, but more recently it had been intimated that neither was likely to be included in the new cabinet.

Six ministers—Rt. Hon. C. J. Doherty, justice; Hon. Dr. Reid, railways and canals; Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce; Hon. R. W. Wigmore, minister of customs and excise; Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration, and Hon. P. E. Blundin, postmaster-general, have retired. There are nine new ministers with portfolios and two without portfolio.

The new men are: J. A. Stewart (Lanark), minister of railways and canals; H. H. Stevens (Vancouver), minister of trade and commerce; R. B. Bennett, K.C. (Calgary), minister of justice; R. G. Manion (Fort William), minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment; L. G. Macdonald (Three Rivers), president of the privy council; J. B. M. Baxter (St. John, N. B.), minister of customs and excise; L. G. Bell, K.C. (Quebec), postmaster-general; Dr. J. W. Edwards (Frontenac), minister of health, immigration and colonization; Rodolph Monty (Montreal), secretary of state, and Edmund Briston, K.C. (Toronto), and James Wilson (Saskatoon) without portfolio.

Ministers Retained.
The portfolios in which there is no change are: Prime minister and minister of external affairs, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen; finance, Sir Henry Drayton; militia, Hon. Hugh Guthrie; marine and naval, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne; interior, hon. works, Hon. P. B. McCurdy; agriculture, hon. works, Hon. G. D. Robertson.

Sir Edward Kemp and Hon. E. K. Spinnery (Yarmouth and Clare) remain ministers without portfolio.
The post of solicitor-general remains to be filled, and an announcement will be made in a day or so, so this portfolio is expected to be appointed to another office, but as yet the prime minister has not indicated what that office will be.

Of the old cabinet members who are retired, Hon. J. A. Calder, Hon. J. D. Reid and Sir George Foster are understood to be slated for the senate and Hon. W. E. Wigmore for another appointment outside the cabinet. Hon. P. E. Blundin, postmaster-general, is already a member of the senate.

The new cabinet met this morning in the privy council chamber immediately after the ministers had been sworn in. An announcement as to dissolution is expected by tomorrow.

CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL WILL BE BENEFITED

Receipts From the Lecture of S. S. McClure To Be Paid Over.

Double opportunity is offered the people of London in the visit to the city of Samuel S. McClure to speak Thursday evening in Masonic Hall on Queen's avenue on "World Conditions Today."

The net receipts of the lecture, will be paid over to the Children's Memorial Hospital. This is in accordance with the wish of Mr. McClure. When the members' council of the Chamber of Commerce, which invited Mr. McClure to come to London, wrote to him, asking if he had any preference in the matter of the disposition of the receipts, he answered that he would be pleased if he might help the children of London.

The chamber had intended to devote the receipts of the talk to some object of community concern, and the suggestion from the speaker at once solved the question. In order that the Children's Hospital may be largely benefited, the chamber hopes the sale of tickets will be large. The capacity of the room is about 700, and the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce to hear Mr. McClure is extended to all citizens.

JOINT CANDIDATE FOR BRANTFORD CONSTITUENCY

Brantford, Sept. 21.—It was nearly midnight last night before the U. F. O. gathering held at Maple Grove for Brantford riding dissolved. A strong plea was made by Brantford Labor men for support of the provincially authorized L. L. P.'s choice of A. W. Burt, it being pointed out that the U. F. O. nomination running alone would not stand a chance in this industrial riding. After much discussion it was decided to call a joint conference of ten each from the L. L. P. and the U. F. O., this to select a joint candidate. The L. L. P. refused to expel M. MacBride, M. P., from its organization and disown him for going to the cross benches, the latter being cancelled and granted to a new group here.

SEVEN OF 20 MINISTERS ARE FROM ONTARIO

All Provinces in Dominion Well Represented in the New Cabinet.

FOUR QUEBEC MEMBERS

Nova Scotia May Get Additional Representative in Hector McInnis, K. C.

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—Canadian Press.—All provinces, with exception of Prince Edward Island, are represented in Premier Meighen's new cabinet. Of the twenty announced this morning, seven are Ontario men, four from Quebec, two from Nova Scotia, one from New Brunswick, one from Manitoba, one from Saskatchewan, two from Alberta, and two from British Columbia.

The provincial representation in the cabinet is as follows:
Ontario—Hon. J. A. Stewart (Lanark), Hon. Edmund Drayton (Kingston), Hon. J. W. Edwards (Frontenac), Hon. Hugh Guthrie (Wellington), Hon. R. G. Manion (Fort William), and Sir Edward Kemp (Toronto).

Quebec—Hon. L. G. Bell (Quebec), Hon. R. Monty (Montreal), Hon. L. P. Normand (Three Rivers), and Hon. C. Ballantyne (Montreal).

Nova Scotia—Hon. P. B. McCurdy (Colchester), and Hon. E. K. Spinnery (Yarmouth and Clare).

New Brunswick—Hon. J. B. M. Baxter (St. John).

Manitoba—Hon. Arthur Meighen (Portage La Prairie).

Saskatchewan—Hon. J. A. Wilson (Saskatoon).

Alberta—Sir James Loughheed and Hon. R. B. Bennett (Calgary).

British Columbia—Hon. S. F. Tolmie (Victoria), and Hon. H. H. Stevens (Vancouver).

Nova Scotia may be given another representative if Hector McInnis, K.C., is brought into the cabinet as solicitor-general, as has been forecast in some quarters.

Hon. L. G. Bell, K.C., the new postmaster-general, was elected in 1892 as a member of the House of Commons as a Conservative under the Abolition of the House of Lords.

He was born at St. George, Chicomint County, in 1863. He practiced law at Chicoutimi for some years, and lived for a short time at Chicoutimi, where he was married to a daughter of a local family.

NO AVOIDABLE DELAY IN PASSING BYLAW

E. V. Buchanan Denies That P. U. C. Is "Passing the Buck."

E. V. Buchanan, general manager of the Public Utilities Commission, does not take kindly to the action of those aldermen, who in session Monday evening intimated that the commission is "passing the buck" as an explanation of the delay experienced in passing a bylaw in accordance with the wishes of the city council, prohibiting vehicular traffic in Victoria Park.

The delay is not attributable to the commission, but was due to the fact that the city solicitor failed to prepare a bylaw governing park traffic in time for the last Public Utilities Commission meeting. This bylaw has now been prepared and will be passed by the commission at its meeting Thursday afternoon.

Deputy Sheriff Waterworth has released his death grip on the finances of the London Street Railway, and Treasurer L. Tait of the L. S. R. says that the employees will be paid tomorrow.

As a result of an appeal made to the council on Monday night by C. H. Ivey, solicitor for the company, the council left the matter of seizing the company's daily receipts in the hands of the sheriff.

The council will be jubilant, as they should have got their pay on Tuesday.

Just what arrangement Mayor Little made with the company at yesterday's conference is not known, but it is expected that he has accepted the undertaking which the company's solicitor proposed of paying \$500 a month and interest until the debt is wiped out.

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CLOSE WATCH ON HEALTH OF CITY KEPT BY BOARD

Restaurants, Barber Shops and Bake Shops Closely Inspected.

Milk Supply Watched

Public Health Nurse Made 1,024 Visits During the Month.

The board of health seems to have its finger well on the pulse of the city, judging from the reports presented by its officers at the meeting held on Tuesday afternoon. The conclusion seemed to be that it will be a hard job for an epidemic of any kind to get under way without the city having sufficient notice to marshal its forces to combat it.

The reports presented to the board recorded well over 2,000 visits paid to different places by board officers during the month of August. It may be that in a few cases there was a little overlapping, but not much. For instance, the plumbing inspector and health nurse may have been at the same house during the month. Or the sanitary inspector and plumbing inspector may have been at the same restaurant, but that is all.

Inspected 371 Cows.
Dr. Tamblin, concerned with the milk supply of the city, visited the herds of 371 different owners. Some he called upon two and three times and brought his total visits up to 27. He inspected 371 cows whose product, 3,540 quarts of milk, is sold in the city.

Miss McGowan, the visiting nurse, reported that, along with her other duties, she made 935 calls during the month.

The sanitary inspector, R. H. Sanders, in his report, mentioned specially 225 visits he had made, and also said he called on all the barbers and bakeshops, which would indicate that there are not many places of importance about the city that he does not visit his nose into during the progress of a month. The general tenor of his report was that there has been a material improvement along sanitary lines, especially the restaurants, cafes and butcher shops.

Record in Visiting.
His assistant, Mr. Boss, was also on the go pretty well and made 127 calls. He took twelve samples of drinking water for tests and also looks after quarantine cases.

To Mrs. M. Patterson, the public health nurse, the month's honorarium was \$100, and her total calls number 1,024, and these figures brought forth words of praise from Chairman Cunningham.

The plumbing inspector was not idle, making 128 inspections before issuing permits and 125 in other cases coming under his notice.

CITY HALL DESERTED FOR KITCHENER TRIP

Mayor, Aldermen and Officials Accept Invitation to Banquet.

The city hall is quite deserted of dignitaries, today. With few exceptions only the fair stenographers and other girl aides are holding the fort.

The rumor spread about that there were good things in store for those who succumbed to the call of the Kitchener council, with the result that there was a last-minute rush to go down and limbo, just what, nobody knows.

Early yesterday morning it looked as if the trip which Ald. W. A. Wilson was organizing was going to fall flat. The weather dampened the ardor of many. They realized that the roads would be bad for such a trip. Things, however, took a turn in the afternoon. Some additional information, or, rather, hints, found their way around, and then everyone was going.

The result was that there was not even an acting mayor left to guard the destinies of the city.

Mayor Little, most of the aldermen who were in the city, City Clerk Sam Baker, City Engineer Brazier, Building Inspector Piper, Inspector McCallum and a few ex-aldermen made up the party.

And this morning the belief that the rumors about the things to look forward to were given added weight when the commander-in-chief of the expedition intimated to the press that no reporters were wanted. It was hinted that on the recent Sarnia trip some of the press reports were a little too accurate as to details, and there was a desire to avoid a repetition of this on the Kitchener trip. So the reporters remained at home.

LEDOUX AGREES TO ABANDON "AUCTION" OF N. Y. UNEMPLOYED

Police of Metropolis Will Aid Him in Feeding of Jobless Persons.

New York, Sept. 21.—Urban Ledoux, whose activities in behalf of New York's unemployed have been commended by the police, announced early today that he, the police and the police had arrived at a compromise. He has promised, he said, to abandon plans for holding a modern "slave auction" here, and the police have agreed to aid his efforts to feed the jobless.

Carrying out the terms of the compromise, Ledoux appeared in Bryant Park this morning with a police escort and began distribution of packets good for breakfasts in nearby restaurants. He announced he would open a bread-line at St. Mark's, in the Bowery, on Monday. Lodging also will be provided, and an employment bureau operated, he said.

LOCAL LIBERALS TO SELECT A CANDIDATE ON FRIDAY EVENING

Convention To Be Held in Hyman Hall at 8 p.m.

SEVERAL NAMES MAY BE SUBMITTED

A. T. Little, C. R. Somerville, Dr. W. J. Stevenson and E. S. Little.

Liberals of London will on Friday evening next select their candidate for the coming general election to the Federal Parliament.

An open convention has been called for 8 o'clock in Hyman Hall, in which all Liberal men and women of the city are invited to participate. It is not improbable that several names will be offered for consideration, among them being Arthur T. Little, Mayor Somerville, Dr. W. J. Stevenson, Mayor E. S. Little and Col. Clifford Reason.

Field Is Open.
The field is declared open, however, and all interested members of the party are being urged to attend for the purpose of lending their aid in the choice of a candidate. None of these possibilities have been approached as yet. Just a few days ago a possible nominee, when questioned as to whether he would accept the nomination if such was proposed, alone would forbid him taking any active part in the coming fight.

With this announcement made by the secretary of the Liberal Association at noon today, the local political situation begins to shape itself definitely.

IS G. W. V. A. PET OF PREMIER MEIGHEN?

Distribution of Canteen Funds Unfair, Claims A. and N. V. Speaker.

Disapproval of the action of the present Dominion Administration with relation to the disposal of the overseas canteen funds was strongly expressed again during a regular session of the Army and Navy Veterans last evening.

It appears that the Great War Veterans' Association has received from the Dominion Government a grant of some \$20,000, a part, it is said, of the canteen profits in question. The claim has been made from time to time by members of other soldier associations throughout the country that such action was decidedly unfair.

At last night's gathering Comrade Rawlings explained that the G. W. V. A. was supposed to be a sort of pet of the Federal Government, and referred to the disposal of the canteen funds.

He asserted that even different locals of the G. W. V. A. itself had quite recently gone on record as being unfavorable to the acceptance of this sum, having evidently realized its unfairness.
