Arthur Meighen, had a couple of surprises when he announced his new cabinet this morning, after the ministers had been sworn in by his excellency the governorgeneral, who returned to the city at 8:15 o'clock from Kingston. R. B. Bennett, K.C., of Calgary, succeeds Rt. Hon. C. J. Doherty as minister of justice, and R. J. Manion of Fort William becomes minister of soldiers' civil reestablishment. Both of these men had been prominently mentioned, but more recently it had been intimated that neither was likely to be included in the

New Order Applies to London, Hamilton and Ottawa Only.

Minimum For Experienced Adult Is Set at \$12

All comment or criticism of businessmen affected regarding Order No. 6, as outlined by the Minimum Wage Board of Ontario, and intended to govern female employees in retail stores in cities of more than 50,000 population, will be received at a public hearing scheduled for October 4 in Hamilton. The new order when placed in effect will apply in the cities of Ottawa, Hamilton and London. Toronto is excluded. For the purposes of the newly-proposed regulation the selling force of an establishment will include cashiers, parcelers, messengers, and other employees working with the saleswomen and not on the office or operative staffs, declare the minimum wage board.

SAVINGS OF KIDDIES **VARY IN SCHOOLS**

Highest Average Under Penny Bank System Is 72 Cents, Lowest 2 Cents.

An interesting study of the saving nabit in various parts of this city among school children is afforded by figures received showing deposits by city public school children under the penny bank system for May and June of this year. A total of \$1,753.58 was deposited here during that period in contrast to penny bank deposits amounting to \$904.65 during the same months in 1920. As an example of the study afforded it may be pointed out that the highest it may be pointed out that the highest average amount deposited per pupil in any city school was at Colborne street school, the figure being 72 cents, while the low margin was reached by Victoria school pupils, who deposited an average of 2 cents each in May and June, or one cent per month.
