DAVIS WILL BE HANGED MAY 9 IN MURDER CASE

Found Guilty by Toronto Jury of Slaying Philip Goldberg.

PROTESTS HIS INNOCENCE
Knife Found Near Boy's Body Proves Important Link in Case.

TORONTO, Jan. 22.—Frederick L. Davis, 35 years old, was found guilty by a jury here late yesterday of the murder on Aug. 7, 1920, of Philip Goldberg, an 8-year-old boy, and was sentenced by Mr. Justice Riddell to be hanged on Tuesday, May 9.

Just before he was sentenced Davis was asked if he had anything to say. "All I have to say," he responded, "is that under the eye of God I am innocent."

The jury was out several hours. In his address to the jury, Basil Essery, counsel for Davis, laid emphasis upon the fact that Davis had returned to the Goldberg home the night of the tragedy.

He asked the jury if it was possible that he could have gone into the boy's home and talked to his mother if he had killed the lad. He also drew attention to the fact that there were no blood stains on the knife found near the body. If there had been stains the police would have put that evidence before the jury.

Doubts His Guilt.

Mr. Essery thought it unlikely that a man who had committed a crime would have returned to the scene of the crime and talked to the newspapers. The scratches on Davis' hand he thought were too slight to connect him with a crime that could only have been committed by a criminal. He wound up with an appeal to the jury to give the client the benefit of the doubt.

Gordon Valderon, K.C., crown prosecutor, summed up the case against Davis in a few sentences. He spoke of his flight from the country as an evidence of guilt. The evidence, he declared, was perfectly plain. There was absolutely no doubt that the prisoner had committed this revolting crime.

Mr. Justice Riddell took the same view for in charging the jury he informed them that their duty was quite clear. The police, he said, had very wisely not rested their case on Davis' confession, but had sought to prove the case by linking the circumstances together.

The murder, which took place in a lot adjacent to the Sunnyside Orphanage, was marked by revolting features.

Knife Important Clue.

An important exhibit was a small white bone-handled knife, which Kenneth Blythe, a boy, testified he had found near the spot where the body of the Goldberg boy was discovered. "Bobby" Blythe, another boy, corroborated young Blythe's story. The knife, which was produced in court by Detective McIlwraith, was identified by E. A. Allison, an employee of Canadian Mill Products, 12-14 Mercer street, as one Davis had used when working at the same plant.

Davis was in his cell, Crawford testified, about six weeks, leaving on Aug. 6. He was paid up to Thursday night, Aug. 5, and left with a credit of \$6.50. From the state prison at Auburn, N. Y., recently he had written, asking for the money.

Mrs. Molly Schwartz testified that Davis took a room at her house on the Wednesday preceding the murder. He slept there Wednesday night, Thursday night, Friday night and Saturday night. On Saturday night he told Mrs. Schwartz's little girl "about the accident." On Sunday he asked witness to wake him very early next morning as he had to go to work. On Monday when she went to wake him he was gone.

On the Sunday afternoon following the murder, stated James R. Haig, a war veteran, he saw Davis lying on a couch. Witness noticed two small cuts on Davis' left hand. Davis said they were inflicted by a cat. They did not look like cat scratches, thought witness.

U. F. A. TO BACK BENEFICIAL LAWS

CALGARY, Jan. 22.—(By Canadian Press.)—After fifteen long sessions, the convention of the United Farmers of Alberta was brought to a conclusion last evening. Officers of the association expressed themselves as gratified with the results of the deliberations.

Scores of resolutions were passed during the five days, involving questions of finance, taxation, political action, internal organization and public policy.

The convention in the following resolution endeavors to express their view of the position of the Progressive group in parliament:

"Resolved, that it is the sentiment of this convention that the members of the Progressive party, although the official opposition, will support all legislation that tends to the benefit of the Canadian people, and that this Progressive party will not affiliate permanently with any other party."

The convention asked the provincial government to fix at \$20 the fee for normal maternity cases, with mileage charges and, one-half the fee itself to be guaranteed by the government.

A poll tax on all male residents not otherwise assessed was approved.

WILL FACE TRIAL ON DRUG CHARGE

BRANTFORD, Jan. 22.—Frank Bryan, fish dealer, was committed for trial recently on a charge of administering drugs to a colored woman, who declared in court that Bryan threatened to take her life if she told on him. She disappeared before the trial, and a warrant was issued for her arrest. This afternoon both were arrested on an indecency charge, and Bryan bailed out, while the woman was held.

"HUNGER STRIKER" ENDS FIFTH DAY

WOODSTOCK, Jan. 22.—Peter Robertson continues on his "hunger strike" at the local jail. Robertson commenced his fast on Tuesday evening last, when he was remanded to jail on a charge of not sending his children to school. He has been offered both jail and restaurant meals, but he absolutely refuses to eat, although he occasionally drinks water furnished him by the attendants.

One of the occupants in the fourth story was awakened by the smell of smoke, and sent in an alarm. When the firemen arrived they discovered the blaze in the engine room of the building. The fire was soon got under control. The total damage will be less than \$15,000.

WINDSOR, Jan. 21.—The death occurred at 180 Wellington avenue yesterday of Henry Wallace, formerly of London, Ontario, for more than 40 years an employee of that city. He was 88 years old.

"The Lane That Had No Turning" Exposes Star System

BY JAMES W. DEAN.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—The movie star system is a complex arrangement. The name of the star is frequently used as the box-office attraction while the work of another player is the true screen attraction. An example of this frequent situation is "The Lane That Had No Turning," the film version of Sir Gilbert Parker's novel.

It is the first starring vehicle of Agnes Ayres, but she isn't the star of it. Theodore Kosloff, who was a dancer and, therefore, an adept in pantomime, completely overshadows the star who enhances the picture only by her personal charm.

"The Lane That Had No Turning" also bears out the assertion made frequently in these columns that the motion picture is not a form of literature.

The story has been screened in faithful adherence to the novel version. However, incidents of the book afforded a study of characters, those of a man who became warped mentally and spiritually when his body became deformed and a woman who sacrificed much for that man.

This study in character analysis is lost on the screen. Action subordinates characterization. The film becomes melodrama.

If in the opening chapters of a book one is told that a man is descended from a family suffering with spinal disease and learns that the man meets with an accident to his back, one anticipates the malformation that ensues in later chapters. The malformation develops along with the action of the plot, the time element being taken into account.

This condition is too subtle to be effectively transposed to a motion picture whose action is compressed in an hour. One sees a normal man

one minute and a few moments later sees him hideously deformed in a manner which takes nature months to accomplish.

The same obstacle lies in the development of the character in character. The warping of a mind is either a spontaneous affair, the

switching-off of reason like the switching-off of an electric current, or a gradual process ensuing from the weight of an obsession, of a worry either real or fancied.

The illusion of this latter change is lost in a film which occupies the attention an hour or less.

VISCOUNT BRYCE DIES SATURDAY AT SYDMOUTH

Former British Ambassador To United States Succumbs Peacefully.

HAD BRILLIANT CAREER

Was Member of British Party To International Hague Tribunal.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—Viscount James Bryce died at Sydmouth today.

The end came peacefully and somewhat suddenly. Viscount Bryce had been staying in Sydmouth for the last three weeks, and was extremely energetic to the last.

The first Viscount of Dechmont, Lanarkshire, was born at Fordbank, near Manchester, on May 10, 1838. He was a son of the late James Bryce, LL.D., of Glasgow.

The viscount was educated in the high school and University of Glasgow, and was a scholar at Trinity College, Oxford, where he obtained the degree of B.A. in 1862 and the D.C.L. in 1870.

He was a Fellow of Oriel College in 1862, later spending a year at Heidelberg University. He was made a barrister at Lincoln's Inn in 1867, and practiced law until 1882.

In 1870 he was regius professor of civil law, resigning that office in 1893. He was elected a member of parliament in 1880.

Had Cabinet Seat.

The viscount was under-secretary of state in 1886, and was a chancellor of the duchy of Lancaster, with a seat in the cabinet in 1892, and

was president of the board of trade in 1894. In the same year he was chairman of the royal commission on secondary education. In 1893 he was made a member of the senate of the London University, and was corresponding secretary of the Institute of France in 1891 and a foreign member of the same institute in 1904.

Viscount Bryce was a member of the Royal Academies of Turin and Brussels in 1896, and of Naples, St. Petersburg and Stockholm in 1903. He was corresponding member of the Societa Romana di Storia Patria in 1885, and was a member of the Reale Accademia in 1904. He was one of the British members of the international tribunal at The Hague.

Held Many Degrees.

He received the honorary degree of LL.D. of Edinburgh University in 1883; of Glasgow University, 1886; Michigan University, 1887; St. Andrews, 1902; Aberdeen, 1906; Doctor of Political Science of Royal Hungarian University of Budapest, 1896; Litt.D., Victoria University, 1897; D.C.L., Trinity University, Toronto, 1897; Harvard and Princeton University, 1907; Litt.D., Cambridge University, 1898; Oxford; LL.D., University of Jena, 1908; of California and of Leipzig in 1909; of Buenos Ayres, 1910; of Adelaide and Brisbane in 1912.

From 1899 to 1901, the viscount was honorary fellow of Trinity and Oriel Colleges, Oxford, and president of the Alpine Club. From 1905 to 1906, he was chief secretary for Ireland, and from 1907 to 1913, he was ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary at Washington.
