CONFIRMS SETTLEMENT. Justice Audette Renders Finding in Plate Mill Case.

MONTREAL, May 22.—Judgment was rendered today by Mr. Justice Audette in the exchequer court of Canada confirming a settlement instituted against the federal government by the Dominion Iron and Steel Company for \$10,964,000.

The company's claim arose out of the huge war contract which the government gave the company in 1919 for 250,000 tons of ship plates. The company erected and equipped a modern plate mill and accessories at an outlay of over \$5,500,000, but after the armistice and when less than 50,000 tons of the plates had been rolled, the government had to cancel the balance of the contract owing to the cessation of the war, acknowledging its obligation to pay the loss and damages suffered by the company as a result of the cancellation.

Self-Declared Dyna miter Leaves Kitchener, Taking "Army" With Him

Special to London Advertiser. KITCHENER, May 22.—Kitchener's writer of threatening letters, G. B. Hull, has left the city and is now in the United States, according to a letter written by him to the Daily Record here, in which he states that the paper was in error when it published a news item stating that Hull was a fictitious name.

In his letter to the editor of the Record, Hull states that he signed his correct name, but that the police were not sufficiently awake to catch him. He states that his quitting the city leaves Kitchener in peace with

only that of A. C. Kingstone, St. Catharines.

DREDGE DIGS UP HEADLESS BODY

Mutilated Human Remains Found in Toronto Channel.

TORONTO, May 22.—The body of a man—headless and armless—was dug up out of the bottom of Keating's Channel by dredge No. 10 of the John E. Russell fleet today. The body came out of the water clutched by a leg in the trap of the dredge shovel.

There was no clothing on the remains, nor shoes or stockings. The arms were cut close off at the shoulders, and indications are that the man was murdered.

Medical men who examined the remains think that the arms were cut off by some one with an expert knowledge of surgery. The head was cut clean off just below where the neck joins the body.

This, coupled with the fact that the body was stripped of clothing, leads to the theory of murder.

FORECASTS REVISION OF BANKRUPTCY ACT SOON

Sir Lomer Gouin, Minister of Justice, intimates Change in Bill at Next Session.

OTTAWA, May 22.—Complete revision of the bankruptcy act, either at the next or a subsequent session of Parliament, was forecast in the House of Commons this afternoon by Sir Lomer Gouin, minister of justice. The intimation came when Sir Lomer was introducing a bill amending the bankruptcy act.

The minister felt, however, that radical changes at this time would tend to increase rather than to decrease difficulties. He considered it essential that the bankruptcy act should remain as it is for the present.

The amending bill introduced this afternoon is for the purpose of changing the present act where it does not afford adequate relief for creditors; and to provide for more satisfactory administration by courts, trustees and creditors. Other amendments are to remove doubt with respect to certain sections of the act.
