When he came to Canada in succession to Sir Charles Bagot, the members of the old "family compact" were submitting as gracefully as possible to their defeat. They were doing this openly, but pective purchasers. in secret were keenly on the lookout for a leader who would become the spearhead of a movement to put them back in the position from which they had been ousted, and they found that leader in the Free Press' champion of today, Sir Charles Metcalfe.

It was the Baldwin-Lafontaine government that felt the force of Metcalfe's autocracy, and in protest they resigned office. Sir Charles Metcalfe ruled as absolute monarch without a government of any kind for nine months; he exercised prerogatives that were in excess of the power of the king. Following that he partially filled up the offices under the premiership of Hon. W. H. Draper and called for the general election of 1844, which was unparalleled in Canadian history for bribery and violence. The voice of the people was silenced in that election, and it was not until he retired in 1847 that the voters had a chance to declare their will. It is a matter of history that in 1848 Baldwin, Lafontaine and their Reformer colleagues swept both Upper and Lower Canada.


