At the regular meeting of the trustees of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce yesterday the following letter was read from Collector Wasson, at Port Townsend, in reference to the quarantine regulations at that port: The instructions given by the treasury department requiring vessels from foreign ports to stop at the national quarantine station a sufficient time for inspection were not promulgated, as seems to be the general impression, on account of smallpox in British Columbia. The quarantine station at Port Townsend was established by act of congress March 5, 1888. At this time other quarantine stations were established, namely: One at the mouth of Delaware bey, one on the Georgia of Chesapeake bound from portion British Columbia.
