NOW PREMIER BORDEN IS IN CHARGE

The Liberal Ministry Resigned Office on Friday—The New Cabinet Announced

THE NEW CABINET

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—The cabinet to
be sworn in tomorrow is as follows:

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—At 3 o'clock
this afternoon, Sir Wilfrid Laurier
tendered the resignation of himself
and colleagues to His excellency
Earl Gray.

Before leaving for Rideau Hall,
the premier assembled in his office
all the staff of the privy council
and in a few sincere and graceful
words expressed his personal
thanks to each and all for their
uniformly faithful and efficient
services. He assured them that
he would always be glad to be of
any possible service to them in
promoting their welfare and happi-
ness.

Then he drove alone to Rideau
Hall, where he formally tendered
to Earl Gray the resignation of
his government and recommended
his excellency to call on R. L. Bor-
den to form the new government.
After that Sir Wilfrid drove home
and this evening spent his first
real case-free hours in the welcome
quiet of his library.

Mr. Borden was summoned by
his excellency at 6 o'clock this
evening, and immediately drove
to Rideau Hall.

The incoming premier accepted
the trust which his excellency
imposed in him, and in accordance
with the usual procedure asked
for a brief interlude to select his
colleagues.

WOODLOT INSPECTION

BY GOVERNMENT

Increasing difficulty is being found
in obtaining an adequate supply of
hardwood lumber for the industry
of Canada. The hardwood tracts of
the eastern provinces for a long time
have not been able to meet the
demand, and in 1910 60 per cent of
the hardwood used in Canada was
imported from the United States.

The United States, although with a
much larger supply of hardwood on
hand is also seeing that the annual
consumption far exceeds the annual
growth and that the virgin supply is,
being rapidly reduced. By practical
demonstration it has been proven
that waste land if planted in young
hardwoods, will prove a profitable in-
vestment at the end of twenty-five
years or more, and will improve the
productiveness of the surrounding
farm land.

In the eastern provinces
of Canada and Ontario, particularly
are large tracts of such lands, covered
at present with an unprofitable
tree growth, which through being
sandy, rocky or low lying, cannot be
treated as agricultural lands. The
Forestry Branch of the Department
of the Interior is taking a practical
interest in the farmer's woodlots of
Ontario, in an effort to make other-
wise useless land supply hardwood
lumber to an eager market, with
profitable returns to the wood land
owners. Parties interested in this
matter should correspond with the
Department at Ottawa, which is al-
ready giving practical assistance on
important tracts. Foresters will be
supplied by the Department to look
over tracts of timbered land, estimate
the quantity of timber, advise as to
what species to encourage or plant
according to the locality and general
conditions, and suggest a general
working plan. Such scientific know-
ledge, the result of former investi-
gations, will be of great benefit to
private owners and should be sought
after at once.
