Induction of Rev. John Nell into the Pastorate of Charles Street Church. The induction of Rev. John Nell into the pastorate of the Charles street Presbyterian church took place yesterday afternoon. The church was well filled. Rev. Walter Reid, Weston, read the lessons and preached a sermon.

The moderator questioned Mr. Nell in the usual form as to his belief, and after prayer he descended and shook hands with the youthful clergyman, an example which was followed by all the ministers present. Rev. D. J. Macdonnell addressed the new pastor in a few terse sentences, full of thought and appropriateness, founded on Paul's advice to Timothy, beginning, "Let no man despise thy youth." Prof. Gregg then addressed the congregation, and the drolology was many while Mr. Gilroy conducted Mr. Nell to the door to give him an opportunity of shaking hands with those present.

Six centuries old. W. J. Macdonnell, French consul in Toronto, has in his possession perhaps one of the most interesting relics to be found in the city. It consists of a pane of stained glass taken from the chancel window of St. Mary R-doliffe church, Bristol, England, one of the handsomest and most venerable church edifices in the United Kingdom. The pane was taken out in the year 1750 during repairs to the chancel, which was built in the thirteenth century, thus giving the pane an age of six centuries. When taken from its window to make room for more modern glass it was secured as a relic and found its way across the Atlantic to Boston, where it fell into the hands of Mr. Macdonnell's grandfather in 1790. It is encased in a frame, and is highly prized by its owner.

SILVER PLATE FOR SIR JOHN.

Close of the Conservative Convention Yesterday. The delegates were ready for work again at 10:30 yesterday morning, but Sir John was not; he arrived half an hour later. During this interval a few speakers killed time, among them Hon. J. A. Chapleau. On the arrival of the chief, as everybody called him, addresses from Manitoba and the Northwest were presented. Sir John's reply elicited great applause, including three cheers for Lady Macdonald. Then came the reading of the constitution and rules of the Liberal Conservative union by Dalton McCarthy, Q.C. After which more speeches to kill time.

Meanwhile the premier was given to the board of trade rooms, where a number of merchants discussed the bankruptcy law with him. From this a flattery address was presented by the mayor and a flattering reply made in response. In the afternoon a series of six resolutions upholding the policy of the conservative party were carried. This gave opportunity of speeches from the movers and seconders. The sixth resolution being declared carried, Sir Leonard Tilley rose and made a long speech in which many good points were touched upon, amongst others the opposition policy and the finance management of Sir Richard Cartwright. The entrance of Sir John Macdonnell and of Lady Macdonald was greeted with loud acclamations.

Shortly after his arrival a deputation from the county of Frontenac presented him with a silver canteen-plate which Sir John accepted in a few felicitous phrases. After Sir Leonard came Sir Hector Langevin, then Sir David Macpherson, Hon. R. A. Carson, Hon. Jean Blanchet (provincial secretary, Quebec), and so on. The meeting closed about 5 p.m.
