WATFORD HIGH SCHOOL WINTER TERM REPORT

Friday, 8th inst, Fred Symington, of Plympton, had a small bone in one of his legs broken, while trying to stop his team from running away. He was loading hay in a barn at Perch, and was knocked against a door beam when the horses ran out of the barn.

Kingsville has one of the finest parks on Lake Erie it is said. Arrangements have been made to install a number of swings, slides and also a merry-go-round in the park for the benefit of the children. It is also erecting a ladies' restroom of cobbles construction.

Blenheim lost an esteemed citizen Friday in the sudden passing away of Thomas Slocomb. The deceased was at Rodney visiting his son, William, and on his failure to come to the house at meal time he was discovered lying in a general outside, but with life extinct. It is thought that death was caused by rupture of a blood vessel in the head.

Canadian Oleomargarine regulations have been amended by adding a provision that "no person shall sell offer, expose or have in possession for sale in Canada any oleomargarine bearing on the package or container thereof the trade mark or the name of the manufacturer in which is included any of the words 'butter,' 'creamery,' 'dairy,' or the name of any breed of cattle."

Major J. H. Proctor, representing the Osignon Silk Company, closed a deal with Charles Calver for twenty acres of land just north of the town of Essex. A model orchard of Osignon silkworm trees will be planted. A nursery will be established within the next 30 days, and plans will be working as soon as the new trees are producing leaves. This is the first district that has taken up silk production in Canada.

A site on the west end of Victoria Park, adjoining Christend street, Sarnia, has been selected for the erection of the memorial monument bearing tablets on which will be enscrolled the names of Sarnia's dead war heroes and also all Sarnians who served with the Allied forces during the war and preparations are being made for the construction of the foundation. Mayor George Crawford has suggested that if possible, the unveiling services be conducted on May 24th.

James George, an Indian of the Muncey Reserve, had his thumb all but cut off Thursday morning while working in Frank Henderson's bush, on the towline west of Pingra. He was driving a wedge into a tree when his axe caught in another tree, was deflected and nearly severed his thumb, which only hung by a piece of skin. Martin Ninham, another Indian, bound the thumb up with a chip of wood, and George was taken to Sheddin for treatment. There is a chance of saving it, the doctor says.

Definite action towards the erection of Sarnia's new half-million-dollar Collegiate and Technical School was taken at a special meeting of the Board of Education and Industrial and Technical Committee, following a conference of several days with the architects and lowest tenderers, who have been in the city in consultation with the board and members of the Technical and Industrial Committee. The architects were authorized to prepare an agreement with Second and Sons for general construction work.

Rhea Whitley, four year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas L. Whitley, Sarnia, was nearly burned about the body late Saturday afternoon. While playing around the house she secured possession of a match which she ignited setting her clothing on fire and burning them practically all off before the blaze could be extinguished. A portion of her hair was also burned but her face escaped the flames. But for the prompt action of her mother on seeing her plight, the child might have been burned to death.

The death occurred at the home of her son-in-law, Dr. McMurchy, North Glencoe, Friday, of Mrs. Isabella McTavish, daughter of the late John McCallum, of Ekfrid. The late Mrs. McTavish, who was one of the pioneers of Glencoe, was in her 76th year. Her brother, Duncan McCallum, died on July 4, 1920. Mrs. McTavish lived in Glencoe practically all her life, and was a member of the Presbyterian church here. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. McMurchy, and one sister, Mrs. Nancy Brock, of Yale, Mich.
