Mr. John H. Richardson attended the funeral of the late Mr. Samuel Saunders of Wyoming.

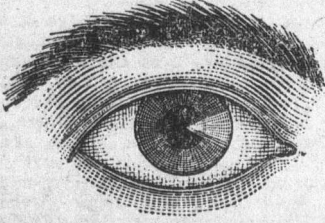
