The Third Party Proposal Discussed The Referendum The Ottawa Strike Street Railway Demands

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held on Friday evening, Oct. 11, at Central Hall. President Young presided in the chair. James L. M. ...

The committee on the report of the Legislative Committee on the subject of the state of trade in the city of Toronto, and will further report on the same at its next meeting.

The report draws attention to the particulars of the case of the Windsor strikers and went on to say:

The above case shows that the fact that the existing laws of conspiracy are neither fair nor equitable, and that the only way to deal with the situation is to amend the law so that it does not give rise to an opportunity of having their rights in any trade union, not existing identical with their own particular interests.

The committee does also call attention to the fact that the members of any other trade union (with a few exceptions) are doubly liable for those who are expelled from the union for "striking to compel others from doing that which they have a legal right to do."

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In this connection, your committee desire to say that in their opinion, the circumstances above referred to, point conclusively to the absolute and urgent necessity of some steps being taken, looking to the formation of a political party.

The Bill for the suppression of frauds introduced by Mr. ... is a serious measure for the protection in a large of such audacious hoodlums and jobbers as has characterized various departments of our government.

The first duty of our legislative body should be to carry into effect the wishes of the majority of the electors. Where the electors have no opportunity to express themselves directly upon the question at issue, it must necessarily happen
