## CANADIANS IN JAPAN

TRANSFER OF PROTECTION OF CANADIAN INTERESTS FROM ARGENTINA TO SWITZERLAND

On the orders of the day:

Right Hon. W. L. MACKENZIE KING (Prime Minister): In accordance with the government's policy of making public as quickly as possible all reliable information received about the welfare of Canadians in enemy hands, a statement about conditions in Hong Kong, received from the British embassy in Chungking, was given to the press last night. It reads:

His Majesty's representative at Chungking reported that he has received information from
