BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

Mr. Churchill: May I ask the acting leader of the house whether we shall continue with legislation tomorrow or carry on with the estimates as already outlined?

Mr. MacNaught: Tomorrow we will take the second reading and the committee stage

and, if the house is agreeable, the third reading stage of Bill No. C-123 to amend certain acts administered in the Department of Insurance.

Mr. McIlraith: That is to go to committee.

Mr. MacNaught: I beg your pardon; after second reading it will go to committee.

Then we shall take up consideration of the balance of the estimates of the Department of Trade and Commerce and the votes referring to Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation under the jurisdiction of the Postmaster General. At the conclusion of these remnants we will consider the estimates of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Mr. Churchill: May I ask whether concurrence in the eleventh report of the procedure committee will be asked for tomorrow or on Friday?

Mr. MacNaught: I understand that the hon. member who is charged with that report proposes to move its adoption tomorrow.
