R.C.M.P. EVIDENCE RESPECTING INFILTRATORS

Mr. John Lundrigan (Gander-Twillingate): My question is directed to the Solicitor General. Several weeks ago he indicated he would consider making a statement on motions regarding R.C.M.P. evidence on infiltrators and their roles in precipitating unrest. Is the minister now prepared to make such a statement on motions and to enlighten the house with regard to the type of information which the R.C.M.P. has on this subject?

Hon. G. J. McIlraith (Solicitor General): I considered the matter and I do not see how a statement can be made on motions giving that type of information to the house. It has not been the practice to give that type of information to the house, but if there are any specific matters that hon. members wish to have cleared up, I would be glad to answer any questions or give such information as can be given.

## GOVERNMENT PUBLICATIONS

AVAILABILITY TO HOUSE OF INFORMATION SERVICES REPORT

Mr. T. C. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): Mr. Speaker, may I ask the right hon. Prime Minister whether he has yet received the report of the three man task force that was appointed to look into government information services, and if he has not received a report, has he any idea when it is likely to be submitted to him?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): I inquired of the chairman of the task force a couple of weeks ago and was told that the report would be submitted before the end of the month. I imagine that we might have to accept a little leeway there, but I know the report is in the last stages of preparation.

Mr. Speaker. When the report is received by the Prime Minister, is it his intention to make it available to the members of the house and to make the contents of the report public?

Mr. Trudeau: I cannot say, Mr. Speaker. It will take some time for the cabinet to consider the report and to decide whether it should proceed by way of immediate implementation of publication for discussion, or alternatively publish a white paper indicating the reforms we envisage in that area. But I appreciate the interest of the opposition. We on the government side feel that the whole area of governmental information is a very important one and that we must proceed with as much speed as possible.

Mr. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): I have a suppelmentary question, Mr. Speaker. In view of the Prime Minister's statement concerning the importance of the matter, with which we all agree, would he agree that it is therefore extremely important that the public and members of the house should have the benefit of the report itself, rather than an expurgated copy of it?
