STUDY OF FINANCIAL SITUATION BY HOUSE COMMITTEE— MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Gordon Towers (Red Deer): Mr. Speaker, I rise under the provisions of Standing Order 43 to raise a matter of urgency. In view of the announcement by the Minister of Finance (Mr. Chrétien) that the government is borrowing 1.5 billion marks through the Deutschbank—the third large borrowing or credit arrangement in two months, for a total of \$5 billion—along with rumours that further borrowing will be required to maintain the Canadian dollar at its current rate, and in view of the fact that this extraordinary borrowing is mortgaging the next generation of Canadians to such an extent that they may not be able to carry the financial load, bearing in mind that government debt already costs \$6.5 billion annually, I would move, seconded by the hon. member for Winnipeg South Centre (Mr. McKenzie):

That the Minister of Finance request the governor of the Bank of Canada to appear before the Standing Committee on Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs immediately to inform hon. members what the financial situation is and how many more loans will be needed this fiscal year.

# ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE

TERMS OF REFERENCE OF MCDONALD COMMISSION—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

That the Solicitor General amend the terms of reference of the royal commission to provide that a specific mandate be provided to the commission as follows:

"The commission shall make recommendations to the appropriate law enforcement officials of charges to be laid forthwith when prima facie evidence of violations of the Criminal Code comes before them."
