DROP IN SOYBEAN AND RAPESEED PRICES—GOVERNMENT POSITION ON COMPENSATION

Mr. Stan Hovdebo (Prince Albert): Madam Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Agriculture. It concerns the grain embargo—just in case he thinks we have forgotten all about it. Soybean and rapeseed prices dropped considerably immediately after the embargo on shipments to Russia was put in place. The price of soybeans dropped about \$25 a ton. Most of this crop is grown in the constituency from which the minister comes. I have been distressed of late to hear that these two crops are not being considered for compensation. Would the minister indicate whether or not these two crops are being considered for compensation?

Hon. E. F. Whelan (Minister of Agriculture): Madam Speaker, these two crops are not being considered for compensation.

Mr. Hovdebo: Madam Speaker, that was a record answer from the minister.

Some hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Hovdebo: I am sure the farmers in Essex County will be as distressed as I am to hear his answer.

Although the minister told us last November that the government was ready to pay compensation, it still has not done so. The minister has avoided tabling any kind of white paper or giving hon. members any indication of how he will calculate the compensation to be paid. Would he explain to the House, and the farmers, why there has been this long delay in making payment of compensation?

Mr. Whelan: Madam Speaker, in the first part of the hon. member's question he acknowledged that part of the delay was

due to the fact that some of the requests for compensation, such as the request by the soybean growers in my area, which he mentioned, were made only a few weeks ago. That caused a delay.

At the time of the finalization of this program all the facts with respect to how it came about will be made public.
