Of all the people who should be talking about disregard for Parliament! I have heard of the pot calling the kettle black. That saying applies here. Are we to forget so soon the parliamentary terrorism that took place in the House when the constitutional Bill was before the Chamber? Do we so soon forget that the parliamentary rules were the last things in the minds of Members of the Opposition at that time when they used physical force, threat and intimidation? Some Hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Simmons: The Hon. Member asks how I explain. It is very simple. More people elected to show their preference for the Tories than the Liberals in their response is the polls.
