The third question is on business investment. Our estimates are that there will be a significant increase in business investment as a result of this tax. It is equivalent, as I have said previously, to a 4 per cent investment tax credit. However, we believe that the transition to this new tax will not upset business investment over the next two years.

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## CANADA-NOVA SCOTIA OFFSHORE DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

**Mr. Ron MacDonald (Dartmouth):** Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Deputy Prime Minister. Once again the Government's negligent handling of the \$200 million offshore development trust in Nova Scotia has reared its ugly head and caused new controversy.

Member does some closer checking, he will find that the widening of the Stellerton–Chief Harbour Highway is well within the responsibility and daily work of a highway department. I will also sav–
