My authority for the statement referred to in your letter was an article which appeared in the Atlantic Monthly of last September on "The Debt Settlement - The Case for Revision" by the Rt. Hon. Philip Snawden. It is one of the best articles I ever read on the war debt and I would strongly advise you, if you have not already seen it, to get it from your library and read it. One sentence is "It was after America entered the war in April 1917 that Britain incurred her debt to America". I saw the statement I made quoted on other occasions, but I cannot remember now what the authorities are. However, as Snowden was Chancellor of the Exchequer during the Labour Government I am quite satisfied to take what he says as true.
