Early in the year of 1907 hundreds of newcomers arrived in Toronto and and wo were unable to find employment. Many were unable to find employment. Many of them unfortunately suffered great hardship and privation. So bad had things become that many letters were written to the newspapers by these people, who justly complained that they had been cruelly deceived. The Globe published a number of these letters from day to day, but made no attempt to relieve the necessities of the sufferers. Even Albert Chamberlain wrote to The Globe, that he thought it was time for Englishmen to protest against the treatment meted out to their fellow countrymen. Still The Globe did nothing but to continue to publish pious platitudes and it looked as the that would be the end of the matter so far as they were concerned.

Real Start of Movement. The World, however, took another ew of the matter and thought that the newcomers. This thought March 21, 1907. The day was bitterly cold and boisterous and many of the newcomers could be seen on the city streets idly wandering around because they had no shelter to go to. His wants were attended and his story published in The World on the morning of March 22. The same morning there appeared an announcement that The World would open a welcome bureau where all newcomers might get advice and assistance towards getting employment, ab

zen to get "a job." Employment for Five Hundred. For over a month this work was car-ried on continuously in The World office, and over 500 men and women were found employment. The work severely taxed the resources of The World staff, and it was found to be absolutely ne-cessary to provide additional machin-ery and accommodation for continuing

the work.

On March 27, a protest meeting was held in the Sons of England Hall, at which it was decided to form a provisional committee to form an organization to carry on the campaign started by The World. Mr. Chamberlain was by The World. Mr. Chamberlain was cleeted chairman of that committee and the members of The World staff who had charge of the work. This committee decided that the new organization should be known as the British Welcome League, and that anyone contributing the sum of one dollar a year should become a member. A constitution was drawn up and submitted to should become a literature of the members at a meeting held in Victoria Hall on April 18. At this meeting the provisional committee, with two exceptions, were appointed the permanent ceptions, were appointed the permanent of the mewspapers of the city at the time. Altert Chamberlain made no claim to be heart Chamberlain made no claim to be the movement, elected president; Emerson Coatsworth, then mayor of the city, treasurer. The World's representative re-elected honorary secretary. Each member of the committee, including the officers, contributed the membership fee of one dollar. Mr. Chamberlain, however, paid the rent of the Sons of England Hall, in addition, a further \$2.
